## DRMI Activities

### Spanagel 400 named for John Dawson

Our classroom, Spanagel 400, has been renamed in memory of Professor John Dawson, who died in February. It will now be known as the John E. Dawson Memorial Lecture Hall. A dedication ceremony is scheduled for Friday, July 5th, and will include the participants of the SIDMC class, the faculty and staff, John's widow, Mary, and the Honorable Don Rice, former DRMI faculty member, former Secretary of the Air Force, and John's best friend. A reception will be held in the Ecker Lounge immediately after the dedication ceremony.

### Class News

DRMC 02-2 finished on May 16th, and included participants from Denmark, Germany, Israel, Malaysia, Norway, Philippines, Slovenia, and South Africa. With no time for a breath of air, DRMI kicked off the third four-week course of the year, DRMC 02-3, on 20 May. The course graduated on June 14th, and included participants from Germany, Italy, Jordan, Kuwait, Malaysia, Norway, South Africa, Spain and Turkey. The 33rd Annual senior course, SIDMC 2002, began June 24th and will finish on July 19th. The 51 participants come from 40 countries.

In April, May, and June, DRMI completed four mobile courses, graduating 37 participants in Honduras, 26 in Vanuatu (12 from Vanuatu, 6 from Papua New Guinea, and 8 from The Solomon Islands), 21 in Hungary, 40 in Thailand (36 Thais, two from Malaysia, and one each from the Philippines and Sri Lanka). ## Professors Fredericksen and McNab Study Impact of Defense Spending on the Malaysian Economy

In this paper we examined the relationship between defense expenditures and economics for Malaysia. We were interested whether defense expenditures were a function of economic growth; whether growth was a function of defense expenditures; or whether the two variables were functions of each other. In statistical terms, we wished to determine whether there was a causal relationship between defense expenditures and economic growth for Malaysia in that many recent studies of this question have failed to find a relationship between the two variables.

The question of whether there is a causal relationship between defense expenditures and economic growth is of concern to defense

officials and policymakers in Malaysia. If there was no discernable relationship between defense expenditures and economic growth, then the Malaysian government could increase (decrease) defense spending without affecting economic growth. On the other hand, if defense expenditures and economic growth were causally linked, then the Malaysian government's plans to recapitalize its force structure could have a significant impact on the growth rate of Gross Domestic Product. Likewise, increases in economic growth resulted from factors other than defense spending would likely result in higher levels of defense spending over time.

Using data from 1961 to 1999, we employed a series of statistical tests and found that there was a statistically significant and positive causal relationship between the defense expenditures and economic growth. Specifically, we find that causality flows from defense expenditures to economic growth and not vice versa. Higher expenditures for defense appear to translate into higher rates of economic growth in one to two years; while defense expenditures appear to be unaffected by higher rates of economic growth. Our findings suggest that the defense sector in Malaysia still influences the rate of economic growth and that policymakers should be cognizant of this effect to avoid "overheating" the economy during periods of high growth.
