

REAR ADMIRAL RALPH W. WEST, Jr., USN Superintendent Naval Postgraduate School


Rear Admiral Ralph W. West, Jr., graduated from the United States Naval Academy in June 1958 and reported to the destroyer USS JONAS INGRAM (DD 938) for his first sea tour. After attending Submarine School and nuclear power training he served on submarines USS TULLIBEE (SSN 597), USS DANIEL WEBSTER (SSBN 626) and USS SKIPJACK (SSN 585). In June 1967, he reported to the staff of Submarine Squadron FOURTEEN at Holy Loch, Scotland for two years as Material Officer. He then served as Executive Officer of USS POGY (SSN 647) commissioning crew. He commanded USS GURNARD (SSN 662) from May 1973 until May 1976.

He subsequently served on the staff of Submarine Group FIVE in San Diego, California until July 1978 when he was assigned as Senior Member, Nuclear Propulsion Examining Board on the staff of Commander in Chief, U.S. Pacific Fleet.

He commanded Submarine Squadron FIFTEEN in Guam from June 1980 to June 1981. His next assignments were Assistant Chief of Staff for Logistics and then Chief of Staff of the Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet. After selection to Rear Admiral, he reported in May 1984 as Deputy Director for Operations, National Military Command Center, JCS. In June 1985, Rear Admiral West assumed command of Submarine Group FIVE in San Diego, California, and in January 1987, he was assigned additional duty s Commander, Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet. Rear Admiral West next served as Director for Pride, Professionalism and Personal Excellence for the Navy for two years. He assumed duties as Superintendent of the Naval Postgraduate School in July 1989.

Rear Admiral West has earned the following medals: Distinguished Service Medal, Defense Superior Service Medal, Legion of Merit (fourth award), Meritorious Service Medal (third award), Navy Commendation Medal (second award), Navy Achievement Medal, and additional unit and service decorations.

Rear Admiral West is married to the former Katheryne Hale of Washington, DC. They have two children, Whitaker and Diana.



ADMIRAL STANLEY R. ARTHUR UNITED STATES NAVY

Admiral Arthur was born in San Diego, California. He entered the U.S. Navy through the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps (NROTC) Program at Miami University and was commissioned in June 1957.

Designated a Naval Aviator in 1958, he reported to VS-21 and later was a "plank wner" in VS-29. Admiral Arthur attended the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School where he earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Aeronautical Engineering, followed by a tour of duty with VX-1, as Weapons Project Officer. After a tour on USS BENNINGTON (CVS 20), he reported to VA-55 aboard USS HANCOCK (CVA 19). He then reported to VA-122 as an A-7 Instructor Pilot and Maintenance Officer. Additionally, he became the first Officer in Charge of COMFAIRLEMOORE Weapons Training Center.

In July 1971, he reported to VA-164 as Executive Officer and assumed command a year later while again deployed on USS HANCOCK. During this tour, he completed over 500 combat missions in the A-4 Skyhawk. He then acquired a Master of Science Degree in Administration from George Washington University. Following assignments at the Bureau of Naval Personnel, he reported aboard USS SAN JOSE (AFS 7) as Commanding Officer in July 1976, and assumed command of USS CORAL SEA (CV 43) in June 1978.

Other significant assignments included the staff of the Commander in Chief, U.S. Pacific Fleet, Pearl Harbor, as Assistant Chief of Staff for Plans and Policy with additional duty as Commander, Rapid Deployment Naval Forces and U.S. Naval Forces Central Command; Commander, Carrier Group SEVEN; Director, Aviation Plans and Requirements Division (OP-50); and Director, General Planning and Programming Division (OP-80). Selected for the rank of Vice Admiral in February 1988, he assumed the duties as Deputy Chief of Naval Operations (Logistics).

On l'December 1990, Admiral Arthur assumed duties as Commander U.S. SEVENTH Fleet and Commander, U.S. Naval Forces Central Command for Operations Desert Shield/Desert Storm. He directed the operations and tactical movements of more than 96,000 Navy and Marine Corps personnel and 130 U.S. Navy and Allied ships, including 6 aircraft carrier attle groups, 2 battleships, 2 hospital ships, 4 minesweepers and numerous combatant and amphibious ships. This represented the largest U.S. naval armada amassed since World War II. On 24 April 1991, he relinquished duties as COMUSNAVCENT and continued duties as Commander, SEVENTH Fleet until his change of command in July 1992. Admiral Arthur assumed current duties as the Vice Chief of Naval Operations on 6 July 1992.

Admiral Arthur has been awarded the Navy Distinguished Service Medal (3 awards), Legion of Merit (4 awards, 1 with Combat "V"), Distinguished Flying Cross (11 awards), the Meritorious Service Medal, individual Air Medal (4 awards), Strike/Flight Air Medal (47 awards); Navy Commendation Medal (2 awards, 1 with Combat "V"), various foreign personal decorations, and additional individual U.S. and foreign service and campaign awards.

Admiral Arthur is married to the former Jennie Lou Mapes of Jackson, Ohio. They have four children; Erin, Brian, Derek, and Brad.

The cap and gown and colorful hood so prominent in commencement ceremonies resemble to some extent articles of dress worn by church and university dignitaries in the Middle Ages. The cap and gown indicate that the wearer is a member of a university or lege. The hood shows the degree the wearer holds.

The gown for the bachelor's degree has pointed sleeves and is designed to be worn or closed. The doctor's gown has bell-shaped sleeves and may be worn open or closed. In the front the doctor's gown has a facing of velvet and three bars of the same material on each sleeve. The facing and bars may be either black or the color distinctive of the subject to which the degree pertains. The cap is worn for all degrees; the doctor may wear a golden tassel.

Hoods are normally black with a colorful lining rolled outward. Bachelor's hoods are three feet long, master's three and one half feet, and doctor's four feet.

For all academic purposes, including trimmings for the doctor's gown, edgings of hoods, and tassels of caps, the colors associated with the different subjects are as follows:

THE NAVAL POSTGRADUATE SCHOOL

The Naval Postgraduate School opened at Annapolis in 1909 and transferred to the Monterey Peninsula in 1952. Since its beginning, the school has conferred over 22,000 degrees. The typical student is an unrestricted line U.S. Naval Officer who has completed an operational tour. Students are engaged in intensive studies leading to a master's degree in one of 41 different curricula. Each curriculum is tailored to provide the academic requirements for an accredited advanced degree and meet the additional educational skill requirements necessary for subsequent assignments. Students are obliged to remain in service for about four years after they complete their schooling. Although most of the graduates receive master's degrees, there are also students working on professional engineering degrees and pursuing doctoral degrees.

Students arrive every quarter, with the heaviest influx entering in June and September. Of the approximately 1800 students now enrolled, 75% are in the United States Navy and Marine Corps, 15% are from other United States services, and the remaining 10% are from allied foreign countries.

Many of the 350 professors at the school are internationally recognized in their respective fields. In order to keep abreast in their fields, faculty members conduct research, most of which is beneficial to other governmental agencies. Over 21 million dollars of research is conducted or administered annually on this campus.

The Superintendent, RADM Ralph W. West, Jr., with the assistance of Provost Dr. Harrison Shull, guides the school in its endeavors. There is also a civilian Dean of Faculty, Dean of Instruction, Dean of Computer and Information, Dean of Research, and two Naval Officers who serve as the Dean of Students/Director of Programs and Director of Military Operations.

The following eleven academic departments comprise the Postgraduate School: Iministrative Sciences; Mathematics; Computer Science; Operations Research; National Security Affairs; Physics; Electrical and Computer Engineering; Meteorology; Aeronautical and Astronautical Engineering; Mechanical Engineering; and Oceanography. There are also four academic groups: Anti-Submarine Warfare; Command, Control and Communications; Electronic Warfare; and Space Systems.

Guests are invited to tour the school grounds and to visit the Naval Postgraduate School seum located in the basement of Herrmann Hall. The museum is designed to capture the h history of both the school and the Old Del Monte Hotel through displays and artifacts.
