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

HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE

The Holocaust was remembered yesterday during Quarters at the Naval Postgraduate School.

Lt. William Brown, NPS Protestant chaplain, recalled the historical background.

On Sep. 1, 1939, the date marking the outbreak of World War II, the German army launched an assault on the Polish Republic. With Poland subdued, Hitler's forces moved on. Within three months, between April and June 1940, Denmark, Norway, the Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg and France fell under Nazi domination. On June 22, 1941, the Nazis were within 20 miles of Moscow. In two years Germany had invaded virtually the whole of Western and Eastern Europe.

Physically and spiritually, Jews were to be extinguished from the memory of humanity. Temporarily, the Nazis found use for some. They experimented on Jews "for science." How much pain does it take to bring on insanity? How much pain does it take to kill? They tortured Jews for amusement. Will it hurt more to wound a Jew - or to force him to watch his wife die or his family suffer? Their humanity was of no worth. The Nazi plan - the Final Solution - put into action a death-machine that systematically took the lives of six million Jewish people, including more than one million children.

The nationwide days of remembrance of the victims of the Holocaust is from April 26 to May 3. This year's theme is: Fifty Years Ago, in the Depths of Darkness.

REFLECTIONS OF A NUGGET NAVAL ASTRONAUT

(Ed. Note. This is the first part in a continuing article, by astronaut Lt. Cmdr. Daniel W. Bursch, a graduate of NPS, on the space program from Project Gemint to the space shuttle program.)

Of the many things I've learned since reporting to NASA, one of the most surprising has been about the overwhelming USN/USMC participation in manned spaceflight, participation which originated with the birth of the U.S. Space

Program. I always knew that the Naval Service was heavily involved in manned space flight, but certainly not to this great extent:

Out of 76 manned missions to date (through STS-42):

- 70 had one or more USN/ USMC astronauts (92%)
- 47 were commanded by USN/ USMC astronauts (62%).

As a member of the Navy in the Astronaut Corps, I was continuing an established Naval tradition in space.

The Naval tradition in space started early, with four out of the first seven astronauts having come from the Navy and Marine Corps. One of those Naval Astronauts became the first American in space (Cmdr. Alan Shepard) and the other

was the first American to orbit the earth (Lt. Col. John Glenn, Jr.) Four of the six manned Project Mercury flights were commanded by Naval Astronauts.

Project Gemini included 10 manned missions. Five of these missions were commanded by Naval Astronauts. Other Naval milestones during Project Gemini included:

- -- First orbital path change of a manned spacecraft (Gemini III, Cmdr. John Young)
- -- First rendezvous between two manned spacecraft (Gemini IV-A, Capt. Wally Schirra, Jr.)
- -- First tethered operations with an Agena Target Vehicle (Gemini XI, all Navy crew of Cmdr. Charles Conrad, Jr. and Lt. Cmdr. Richard Gordon, Jr.)

ASTRONAUT CANDIDATES FOUR NPS GRADS PICKED BY NASA

The recent NASA announcement of the selection of 19 new astronaut candidates for the Space Shuttle program includes four Naval officers who are Naval Postgraduate School graduates.

The 1992 group consists of four pilot astronaut candidates and 15 mission specialist astronaut candidates.

NPS grads among the candidates are:
- Lt. Cmdr. Brent W. Jett Jr., (pilot),
who earned his M.S. in aeronautical
engineering in 1989.

- Lt. Cmdr. Michael E. Lopez-Alegria, (mission specialist), who earned his M.S. in aeronautical engineering in 1988.
- Lt. Cmdr. Kent V. Rominger, (pilot), who earned his M.S. in aeronautical engineering in 1987.
- Cmdr. Winston E. Scott, (mission specialist), who earned his M.S. in aeronautical engineering in 1980.

The candidates were chosen from

2,054 qualified applicants.

Since the beginning of the Space Shuttle program, 92 percent of all flights have had Naval aviators on board.

Selected 1992 candidates will report to the Johnson Space Center in Houston in August to begin a year of training and evaluation, after which they will receive technical assignments leading to selection for shuttle flight crews.

PHYSICAL FITNESS NOT WORTH DYING FOR

"No pain, no gain" "No guts, no glory."

These adages have been around for years, however if you take these statements too literally, you can jeopardize your health or your life.

Since 1987, 31 sailors have died from overexertion while participating in physical fitness programs or sports. Twelve died while off duty and seven during their physical readiness test. Six of the 19 who died while off duty were either playing basketball or had just finished. The victims ages ranged from 19 to 52 and ranks ranged from seaman to admiral.

OPNAV 6110.1D requires sailors to achieve and maintain certain standards of physical readiness. Because some people have trouble meeting body fat or physical readiness standards, they take

shortcuts in their conditioning programs. This instruction does not say you have to be fit in a day, however it does give guidance on getting fit.

Before starting an excercise program, a person should know:

- * How to monitor your heart rate.
- * How to warm up and cool down.
- * How to select the proper shoes and clothing.
- * How to determine the level of intensity of exercise.
- * How to recognize the warning signs of overexertion.
