

(Ed. note: This article begins a series about military construction projects in progress and planned for the Naval Postgraduate School campus this fiscal year. There are between 40 and 50 construction contracts in progress or pending, and articles will appear in the Quarterdeck as contract work impacts on NPS personnel. Toward the end of next week, it is anticipated that Cunningham Road will be closed to allow for repair of a rupture in a steam line running underground from the library to the K parking lot.)

The military construction contract for the addition to the Dudley Knox library and the new academic building across the street from the fire station should be awarded by mid-summer.

Contract work is expected to take a year and a half.

By late August, construction of a library addition and academic building will eventually see the loss of several hundred parking spaces from three lots near the library, fire station, gym, multipurpose room and adjacent areas. During the construction, the contractor will close Cunningham Road from the 3rd Street gate to Stone Road to all vehicle and pedestrian traffic except for emergency vehicles from the fire station. Because fire station vehicles have priority, the fire station has been modified to have doors on the south side of the building and closed on the east side. Additionally, the contractor will have construction sites on either side of Cunningham Road fenced off from all vehicles and pedestrian traffic.

9th Street Gate

Because the main gate will be closed to normal vehicle and pedestrian traffic,

another construction contract will be awarded to widen the 9th Street gate to four lanes of traffic: two inbound and two outbound lanes extending to the end of Parking Lot W across the street from the Motor Pool Dispatch Office. Also, NPS personnel already have noticed that there is no more parking allowed on Morse Drive from 9th Street Gate to Stone Road. This change was needed to handle increased vehicle and pedestrian traffic as a result of the main gate closure and allow heavy delivery trucks negotiate a two-lane road.

Long-range planning

The new academic building will be constructed at an angle to 5th Avenue so that it faces the same direction as the other academic buildings. Long-range planning is to have the campus composed of buildings in three quadrangle areas: on the western edge, one for academic purposes; a central one for administrative uses and an industrial area on the eastern side. Public Works Department plans now call for the present site of the child development center to be moved to a new location in La Mesa Village.



Registered engineers

Navy Relief fund drive starts today

The 1990 Navy Relief Fund Drive for the Naval Postgraduate School and its tenant commands in the Monterey area starts today and will continue until June 6.

The annual fund-raising campaign is traditionally conducted during the period of May 4 to June 6, in commemoration of the battles of the Coral Sea and Midway, which occurred on those dates in 1942.

The fund drive intends to inform Navy and Marine Corps personnel of the vital services the Society renders and to solicit voluntary contributions. Since its founding in 1904, the Navy Relief Society has been a principal source of emergency assistance to members of the Navy and Marine Corps, both active and retired, as well as their dependents and survivors. The Navy Relief Society responds with aid in the form of interest-free loans, grants, or gratuitous service.



This year's goal of \$52,275 exceeds last year's contributions of \$45,456.90 by 15 percent. The command's progress will be tracked weekly on a sign posted behind the West Wing of Herrmann Hall. Project officers and campaign leaders attended the kickoff meeting yesterday to receive their indoctrination by this year's activity chairperson, Lt. Denise Stich. Rear Adm. Ralph W. West Jr., NPS superintendent, made opening remarks at the meeting.


