## Federal Women's Program honors 'best' FNOC's Panek nets dual recognition

When Karin Strasser Kauffman began teaching at the University of California, Los Angeles in the 60s, she said hardly a book had been written about women and their achievements.

That's changed, Monterey County's fifth district supervisor told the audience at the Fourth Annual Federal Women's Program Awards Luncheon held in Herrmann Hall's Barbara McNitt Ballroom on March 22.

"There should be no excuse today," she added, "for someone saying, 'I don't have a favorite woman in history.'"

Highlighting the luncheon was the naming of the Federal Women's Program 1989 People of the Year.

Sherryl Panek, a computer systems analyst at Fleet Numerical Oceanography Center, was named both Employee of the Year and Woman of the Year.

Lt. Cmdr. Barry Boyd, Naval Post-graduate School supply officer, is the Supervisor of the Year, and Gloria Norton-White, a purchasing agent in the Supply Department, is the Outstanding Equal Opportunity Official of the Year.

In his closing remarks, Rear Adm. Ralph W. West Jr., NPS superintendent, said, "It is time to re-dedicate ourselves to the purpose of the Federal Women's Program and work to remove those barriers that still exist."

## Former NPS professor receives Navy's highest civilian award

A retired NPS Distinguished Professor Emeritus was presented the highest award the Secretary of the Navy can bestow upon a Department of the Navy

civilian employee.

Dr. Allen Fuhs, chairman of the Space Systems Academic Group until 1987, received the Distinguished Civilian Service Award from Rear Adm. Ralph W. West Jr., NPS superintendent. The award is signed by former Secretary of the Navy James Webb.

Fuhs, who began at NPS as a professor of aeronautics in 1966, was awarded the title of distinguished professor in 1974. During his NPS tenure he served separate stints as chairman of the Aeronautics Department, Mechanical Engineering Department, and

## Uniform changes to summer whites

The uniform of the day for all U.S. Navy personnel at the Naval Postgraduate School switches to summer white on April 30.

The third Tuesday of every month is officially designated uniform day at NPS, so all U.S. Navy personnel will wear the summer white uniform on that day.

All watchstanders at NPS will wear summer whites, the prescribed uniform of the day. Summer whites are an authorized uniform for all NPS personnel not on watch.

Officers and chief petty officers will be authorized to wear khaki as an alternative uniform. They still must wear summer white for watchstanding.

The designated senior service representatives for other U.S. military branches will prescribe uniforms for their personnel to correspond with authorized or prescribed Navy uniforms.

Space Systems Academic Group.

Fuhs was recognized in the citation for outstanding performance at the Naval Postgraduate School and as the driving

force in establishing two new space systems curricula - space systems engineering and space systems operations - which filled an urgently needed capability for the armed services.

The citation further recognized Fuhs' contributions as a teacher, researcher and his dedicated service on government boards and professional societies. During his career, Fuhs was the editor-in-chief of several major scientific journals and president of the prestigious American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics.

Fuhs completed his undergraduate work in mechanical engineering at the University of New Mexico. He holds a master's degree and doctor of philosophy in mechanical engineering from the California Institute of Technology.

### Census

The 1990 Decennial census will be held next week at NPS. The census is required by Article 1, Section 2 of the Constitution of the United States.

The Secretary of Defense and the Bureau of the Census have agreed that the military services will conduct their own enumeration (census).

NPS will conduct the census in coordination with a representative of the Salinas District Office of the Census Bureau. The representative will provide appropriate forms and questionnaires, and will conduct training for personnel designated as unit representatives and census clerks.

It is intended that all military personnel will complete a Military Census Report whether living in private residences, military family housing or group quarters (BOQ, BEQ). Personnel living in other-than-group quarters will, in addition to the Military Census Report, participate in the general census of the United States. These personnel will receive the appropriate census questionnaires from the Census Bureau by mail at their homes.

All unit representatives and census clerks will be trained and sworn-in as census workers by the Bureau of Census. All hands will complete and return to their unit representatives a Military Census Report between April 2 and 6.

### Voting

In this year's West Virginia primary on May 8, voters will choose candidates for one U.S. senator and four U.S. representatives. State office vacancies include treasurer, attorney general, 34 senate seats and all 100 house of delegate seats.

Candidates winning these primaries will run for office in the general election on Nov. 6.

Members of the U.S. Armed Forces, their spouses and dependents may register and request ballots by submitting a completed federal post card application not later than 30 days before the election.

The voting information center has recorded messages from the candidates as well as other information concerning the elections. Voters may call autovon 223-6500 or (202) 693-6500 to hear the mes-

sages. The voting information center can receive calls and answer questions 24 hours a day. Voting assistance counselors may also contact their service voting action officers through the voting information center.

### Student brief

The superintendent, director of programs, assistant director of programs, director of military operations, security manager, safety manager and international education officer will address all new students at 3:15 p.m. Tuesday in King Hall.

Attendance is mandatory. Topics to be covered are security management, safety, the honor code, the Officer Student Advisory Council and the international sponsor program.

All students whose first quarter convene on April 2 will attend, including those students who arrived in February for the six-week refresher. Curricular officers will provide a list of attendees to the security officer, Code 043, and to the Safety Officer, Code 005, by close of business Tuesday, April 10.

A microfiche copy of your service record must be ordered using NAVPERS Form 1070/879. This form also is available at PSD Monterey's Customer Service Office.
