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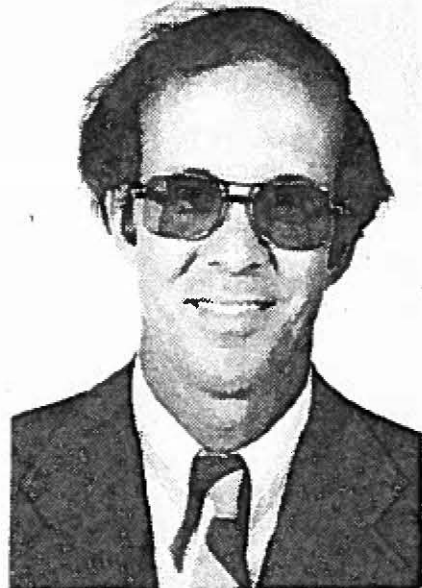
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RESUME OF ROBERT LEE HANEY

Robert L. Haney was born in Newport News, Virginia, in 1938. After high school he attended the U.S. Air Force weather observer and weather forecaster schools as a member of the District of Columbia Air National Guard. He then enrolled at the George Washington University in Washington, D.C., where he majored in mathematics. During the summers he worked as a student trainee in the Extended Forecast Division of the National Meteorological Center, and after his sophomore year served one year of active duty with the U.S. Air Force during the Berlin Crisis. He received the degree of Bachelor of Arts from the George Washington University in June 1964.



In September 1964 he began graduate study in meteorology at the University of California at Los Angeles. While at UCLA he was awarded a four year National Science Foundation trainee fellowship, and received the Doctor of Philosophy degree in March 1971. In 1970 he joined the faculty of the Naval Postgraduate School where he is teaching in the Department of Meteorology. In 1975 he was granted tenure and promoted to Associate Professor, and in 1980 he was appointed Academic Associate for Meteorology and Air-Ocean Sciences programs.

He is active in research on problems of large-scale ocean-atmosphere interaction and ocean circulation modeling. At the present time he is serving on the Executive Committee of NORPAX, an international research program which is investigating the causes of large-scale temperature fluctuations in the North Pacific Ocean and their possible effect on the atmosphere.

He is a member of the American Meteorological Society, the American Geophysical Union, The Canadian Meteorological and Oceanographical Society, the Society of Sigma Xi and the National Geographic Society.
