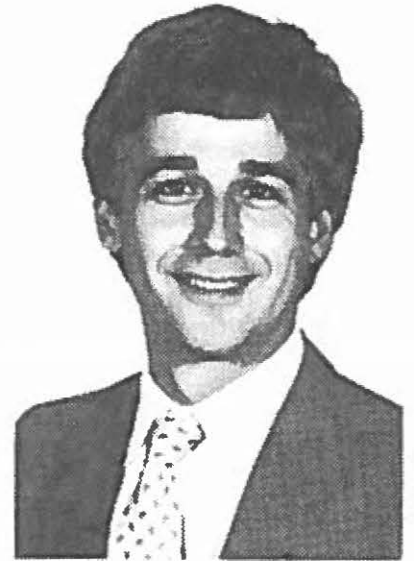

## RESUME OF DAVID R. HENDERSON

David R. Henderson was born in Boissevain, Manitoba, Canada on November 21, 1950. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree with a major in Mathematics from the University of Winnipeg (1970), a Master of Arts degree in Economics from UCLA (1974), and a Ph.D. in Economics from UCLA (1976).



He has been an Assistant Professor of Economics in the Graduate School of Management, University of Rochester (1975-79), a Senior Policy Analyst with the Cato Institute (1979-80), a Visiting Assistant Professor in Economics at the University of Santa Clara (1980-81), a Special Assistant to the Assistant Secretary for Policy in the U.S. Department of Labor (1981), and a Senior Staff Economist with the President's Council of Economic Advisers (1982-84).

His articles have been published in a number of books and in History of Political Economy, the Journal of Monetary Economics, Cato Journal, Fortune, the New York Times, the Chicago Tribune, Reason, Human Events, and Policy Report. He has contributed sections of the Economic Report of the President for 1983 and 1984. He has also testified before the House Ways and Means Committee and the Senate Armed Services Committee. He has spoken before the Commonwealth Club of California, the Chicago Council on Foreign Relations, and the Ripon Society. He is an active member of the American Economics Association and the Mont Pelerin Society.

He is currently and Adjunct Research Professor in the Administrative Science Department.
