RESUME OF PHILLIP EIN-DOR

Phillip Ein-Dor was born in Melbourne, Australia on August 6, 1934. He attended Hebrew University of Jerusalem, receiving a Bachelor of Arts degree in Economics in 1957 and Diploma of Business Administration in 1960. He did graduate work at Carnegie-Mellon University which awarded him a Master of Science in Industrial Administration in 1970 and Doctor of Philosophy (Systems and Communications Sciences) in 1971. His doctoral thesis, directed by Professor Herbert Simon, studied the human processing of visual information and suggested a model for such processes.

Prior to his academic career, he was employed by the government of Israel as an economist in the Ministry of Finance and by IBM (Israel) as a sales representative. He is a tenured member of the Faculty of Management at Tel-Aviv University, currently on sabbatical leave. Other teaching positions have included Cornell University, Hebrew University of Jerusalem and the University of Pittsburgh.



He joined the faculty of the Naval Postgraduate School as an Adjunct Professor in August 1978. His teaching and research at NPS have concentrated on management information systems and on the economics of computers. He has completed a book and several papers on these topics while at the school.

Professional societies of which he is a member include the Association for Computing Machinery, The Institute of Management Sciences, The Information Processing Association of Israel, and The Society for Management Information Systems.
