RESUME OF CHARLES J. LACIVITA

C. J. LaCivita was born in Youngstown, Ohio on 20 July 1946. He graduated from the University of Detroit with a Bachelor of Electrical Engineering in 1969. After receiving his Bachelor's degree, Professor LaCivita served as a pilot in the Air Force for five years. After leaving the Air Force, he attended Valdosta State College where he earned the degree Master of Business Administration in 1975.

Additional graduate study at the University of California at Santa Barbara resulted in the degree Doctor of Philosophy in Economics in 1981. From 1981 to 1985, he was Assistant Professor of Economics at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

In May 1985, Dr. LaCivita joined the faculty of the Naval Postgraduate School as an Assistant Professor at the Defense Resources Management Institute. He was promoted to Associate Professor of Economics in 1987 and was the Assistant Director for Academic Programs from 1988 to 1991. In 1991, he was appointed as the Deputy Executive Director of DRMI. In 1993, he was appointed Executive Director and promoted to Professor of Economics.

He has published widely in a number of areas in economics. His current research concerns the relationship between accounting costs and economic costs and their use in promoting more efficient management of defense resources.
