RESUME OF JOSEPH EDWARD PLUTA

Joseph E. Pluta was born on 11 August 1946 in Chicago, Illinois. He received a B. A. in 1967 and an M. A. in 1968 from the University of Notre Dame. He holds a Ph. D. (1972) from the University of Texas, where he received the Ayres-Montgomery Award for Teaching Excellence.

After graduation he served on the faculty of the University of Texas as Assistant Director of Undergraduate Studies in the Department of Economics, and taught at the University of North Florida in Jacksonville.

He has written on public expenditure patterns at federal, state, and local levels in the United States, as well as comparative public sector studies of ten nations in Western Europe and five South American countries. Both of the latter were funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities.

In June 1974 he joined the faculty of the Naval Postgraduate School where he is teaching in the Defense Resources Management Education Center.

A member of Omicron Delta Epsilon, he also holds membership in the following societies: American Economic Association, American Academy of Political and Social Science, American Association of University Professors, Southern Economic Association, Southwestern Social Science Association, World Future Society, Union for Radical Political Economics, Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, and Association for Humanistic Psychology.
