RESUME OF ROBERT von PAGENHARDT

Robert von Pagenhardt was born in St. Louis, Missouri, in 1923. He holds three degrees from Stanford Univ; B.A., summa cum laude (1948), M.A. (1954) in International Relations and Ph.D. (1970) in Political Science and History. His doctoral thesis was: "Toward an Atlantic Defense Community: The First Effort, 1960-66" (The Story of the MLF). Earlier, he attended the School of Foreign Service, Georgetown Univ. (1942-43); The Army Foreign Areas Program, Queens College, N.Y. (1944); and from 1949 to 1951 pursued graduate work at the Institutes of Policy Studies, Universities of Bordeaux and Paris.



He served in the U.S. Army from 1943 to 1946 becoming the Chief NCO for Civil Affairs, Philippine Islands at the close of World War II.

Prior to becoming an American Foreign Service Officer in 1956, he interned as staff aide to UN Secretary-General Trygve Lie; was a Fulbright Scholar in Europe; was Deputy Director of the World Affairs Council of Northern California; and taught political science at Stanford Univ. and the Univ. of Santa Clara.

While an American Foreign Service Officer, he served as UN Political and Parliamentary Advisor in the Bureau of International Organization Affairs at the Department of State (1956-59); Economic and Consular Officer in the Embassy to Pakistan (1959-61); the Political Advisor of the Permanent Mission to UNESCO (1962); International Principal Secretary of the (Eight Nation) Multilateral (Nuclear) Force Working Group (1963-67); and the Special Assistant or Political-Military Advisor to Ambassadors Thomas K. Finletter and Harlan Cleveland, respectively, at the US Delegation to NATO (1962-67).

In August 1967 he joined the faculty of the Naval Postgraduate School, Monterey, California, where he teaches in both the Defense Resources Management Education Center and the School. His primary interests are national/international security affairs, futures research and public science policy. Additionally, he assists the Superintendent as International Affairs Advisor (POLAD) and chairs the School's Inter-disciplinary Committee on Science, Technology and Public Policy.

He is the author of a monograph on The Force and Effect of UN General Assembly Recommendations and classified papers and dispatches. He is a member of American Foreign Service Assn., American Political Science Assn., Aspen Institute for Humanistic Studies, Futures Planning Council (sponsored by Episcopal Diocese of Calif., International Studies Assn., UN Assn. of USA, World Affairs Council of Northern California and World Future Society. He is listed in Who's Who in the West.
