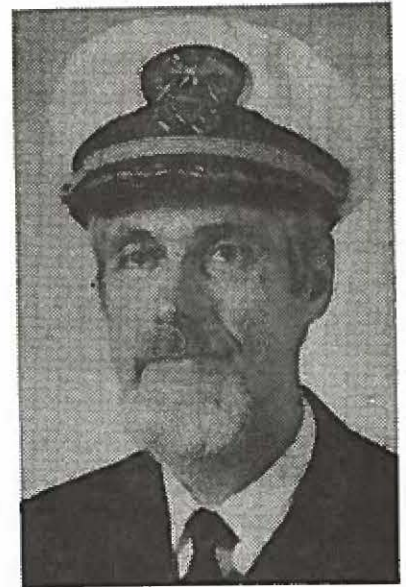

## RESUME OF DEAN TAYLOR, JR.

Dean Taylor, Captain, U. S. Navy, was born in Mason, Michigan, on 12 April 1923. He began his Naval career as an aviation cadet in 1943. A year later he entered the United States Naval Academy and graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in 1947.

He then served on the heavy cruiser HELENA for three years, spent the next few months on the Staff of Commander, First Fleet, and then entered submarine school in January 1950. His first duties as a submariner were successive tours aboard the attack submarines PICKEREL, GUITARRO, and MENHADDEN.



After studying mechanical engineering and chemistry at the Naval Postgraduate School, Monterey, California, in 1956 he attended Case Institute of Technology to study for his doctoral degree in chemistry. He received the Ph. D. degree in chemistry in 1960 when he returned to Case after serving as Commanding Officer of the submarine BARRACUDA.

In mid-1960 he took command of the attack sub CONGER for one year and then returned to the Submarine School in New London, Connecticut, as Instructor and Director of the Nuclear Power School. He returned to the Naval Academy as an Instructor in the Weapons Department and Director of the Academic Computing Center. In 1966 he became Executive Officer of the submarine tender FULTON. He later served as Division Commander of Submarine Division 82 in New London. His last shipboard command was the ammunition ship CHARA.

From 1970 to 1973, he served as Technical Plans Officer and Branch Head in the Navy Strategic Systems Project Office in Washington, D. C., and then in the Development Branch, Requirements and Development Division of the Organization Joint Chiefs of Staff.

In January 1975 he assumed duties as Chief of Staff of the Naval Postgraduate School, Monterey, California.

He is a member of the American Chemical Society, U. S. Naval Institute, American Association for the Advancement of Science, Association of Computing Machinery, Society for Engineering Education, American Personnel and Guidance Association, and the American Association for Higher Education. He pursued part time graduate studies in counselor education at American University in Washington, D. C., from 1971 to 1974.
