
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
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
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
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




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Now that you have received orders to duty at the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School, you are about to join the many who have found their tours of duty here among the best of their careers.

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Historical Background and Mission U.S. NAVAL POSTGRADUATE SCHOOL, Monterey

The brief historical sketch which follows traces the evolution of the Naval Postgraduate School from its modest beginning at the Naval Academy in 1909 with a class of ten officers enrolled in one curriculum — Marine Engineering — to the present day in its new location at Monterey, California, with about eleven hundred officer students in twenty-seven curricula in engineering and related subjects in the Engineering School, General Line and Naval Science School and Management School. The growth and development of the school has been in keeping with its original objective of providing technical education capable of administering and directing a modern Navy.

The need for technically trained officers became evident at the turn of the century. The idea of a naval graduate school had its inception in a course of instruction in Marine Engineering which the Bureau of Engineering instituted in 1904. The results of this course were so encouraging that in 1909 the Secretary of the Navy established a School of Marine Engineering at the Naval Academy in Annapolis. In 1912 the School was designated the Postgraduate Department of the U. S. Naval Academy.

The operation of the School was temporarily suspended during World War I. In 1919 classes were resumed in the converted Marine Barracks on the Naval Academy grounds. At this time curricula in Mechanical Engineering and Electrical Enginering were added. With the passing years other curricula—Ordnance Engineering, Radio Engineering and Aerological Engineering—were added as the Navy's need for officers with technical knowledge in these fields became evident.

In 1927 the General Line School was established within the Postgraduate Department to provide courses of instruction to acquaint junior officers returning from sea duty with modern developments taking place in the Navy. The courses dealt with naval and military subjects for the most part. The General Line School remained as an integral part of the Postgraduate Department until the declaration of the emergency prior to the outbreak of World War II, at which time it was discontinued because of the need for officers in the fast growing fleet.

The enrollment in the Postgraduate Department increased rapidly in the war years both in the several engineering curricula and in the communications curriculum which was added to meet the need for trained communication officers in the naval establishment. The School outgrew its quarters necessitating the building of an annex to house the additional classrooms and laboratories required. Even with this addition, the space requirements of the expanded school were not met.

The post-war program called for yet further expansion and the reestablishment of the General Line School with a greatly increased enrollment. In 1946 the General Line School was established at Newport, Rhode Island, as an outlying element of the Postgraduate Department and in 1948 an additional General Line School was established at Monterey, California. The objective of the General Line School program for the reestablished schools-that of providing an integrated course in naval science to broaden the professional knowledge of unrestricted line officers of the Regular Navy-continued in effect as it had since the inception of this program. (The current curriculum is designed to provide such a course of approximately 91/2 months in length.)

The physical growth of the School and its increase in scope and importance were recognized in Congressional action which resulted in legislation during the years 1945 to 1951 emphasizing the academic level of the School, establishing the School as a separate naval activity, and providing for continued growth in a new location with modern buildings and equipment. This legislation authorized the School to confer Bachelor of Science, Master of Science, and Doctor's degrees in engineering and related subjects; created the position of Academic Dean to insure continuity in academic policy; established the School as a separate naval activity to be known as the United States Naval Postgraduate School; authorized the establishment of the School at Monterey, California and provided funds to initiate the construction of buildings to house modern laboratories and classrooms at that location.

On 22 December 1951, by order of the Secretary of the Navy, the United States Naval Postgraduate School was officially disestablished at Annapolis, Maryland, and established at Monterey, California. Concurrently with this relocation, the U. S. Naval School (General Line) at Monterey was disestablished as a separate military

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command and its functions and facilities were assumed by the U. S. Naval Postgraduate School. At the same time there was established the U. S. Naval Administrative Command, to provide logistic support, including supply, public works, medical and dental functions, for the School and its components.

In August 1958, a Bachelor of Science curriculum was inaugurated at the General Line School to supplement the Navy's five-term college program. The name of the school was then changed to General Line and Naval Science School. Further developments resulted in recognition of the need for a Bachelor of Arts Program, which was subsequently inaugurated in the General Line and Naval Science School in August 1961.

The U. S. Naval Postgraduate School now comprises the Engineering School, the General Line and Naval Science School, and the Naval Management School, each with its own director and the Administrative Command under a Commanding Officer. In command of the Naval Postgraduate School and all of its components is a line officer of flag rank in the Regular Navy with the title of Superintendent. The present Superintendent is Rear Admiral Marshall E. Dornin.

The assigned mission of the U. S. Naval Postgraduate School is "To conduct and direct the instruction of Commissioned Officers by advanced education, to broaden the professional knowledge of General Line officers and to provide such other indoctrination, technical and professional instruction as may be prescribed to meet the needs of the Naval Service. In support of the foregoing, to foster and encourage a program of research in order to sustain academic excellence."

Background and History

U.S. NAVAL AIR FACILITY, MONTEREY

U. S. Naval Auxiliary Air Station, Monterey, was officially commissioned on 24 May 1943. The station at that time had as its mission the administering, operation and maintaining of facilities and services for the support, operation, maintenance and training of Fleet Units and personnel. This mission was accomplished by establishing increased repair facilities which changed the station from Class "D" to Class "C", providing a Torpedo Unit aboard the station for the purpose of conditioning and reclaiming torpedoes dropped in the torpedo range. A ground training unit was established in November 1944 for training of aircrewmen and pilots. The mission was carried out until October 1945, when the station was ordered disestablished. The station was then put in a caretaker status 1 November 1945. On 20 December 1947, the station was reactivated and the mission changed to that of providing aircraft and air facilities to maintain flight proficiency of aviators attached to the staff of the U.S. Naval School (General Line), and aviators ordered to attend the school. Station personnel at that time consisted of 12 officers and 105 enlisted men. Aircraft allowance was 46. The station was operated under a joint agreement between the United States and the Monterey Peninsula Airport District with the Navy operating the Control Tower and the Monterey Peninsula Airport District physically located in the Operation Building, on the North side of the field. In August 1953, by Modification to Lease NOy(R)-36820, the Monterey Peninsula Airport District was physically moved to the South side of the field and the Navy assumed control of the entire North side.

In July 1956, the current mission of the Naval Air Facility was received, which reads, "To maintain and operate facilities and provide services and material to support the aviation requirements of the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School, and to support



of those activities and units designated by the Chief of Naval Operations."

Runways are relatively short—one being 4,000 feet and the other 5,000 feet in length. Runway width is 150 feet for both runways.

The U. S. Naval Air Facility is under the military command of the Commander, U. S. Naval Air Bases, Tweifth Naval District, and under the management control of the Chief, Bureau of Weapons. The Commanding Officer reports for additional duty in connection with Aviation flight matters to the Superintendent, U. S. Naval Postgraduate School, Monterey. Rear Admiral Marshall E. Dornin is Senior Officer Present in the Montercy Area and, as such, calls upon the Naval Air Facility to participate in various functions of a public relations nature.

Brief History of the MONTEREY PENINSULA

La Bahia de los Pinos (Bay of Pines), now Monterey Bay was first discovered by Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo on November 17, 1542 only 50 years after Columbus' discovery of America. It was not till December 17, 1602 that the bay was again visited —this time by Sebastian Viscaino who landed and reaffirmed Spain's claim to California and gave the port the name of Monte Rey after the Viceroy of Mexican Affairs who sent him on the expedition. Under a giant oak tree he gave thanks to God for the safe journey for his band of 200 men.

The first mission was established in 1770 by an expedition by both land and sea of Portola, Rivera Luspi and Serra. They founded the Mission and Presidio of San Carlos de Borromeo de Monterey. It was under the same oak that the Viscaino prayed 168 years earlier that Fray Junipero Serra said mass for his brave group of explorers. A part of this oak is still standing behind the Royal Presidio Chapel on Church street.

A year later, in 1771, Father Serra moved to the Carmel Valley to establish his Capital Mission. This location was chosen because the valley held more promise for farming and orchards and at the same time removed the Mission from the military atmosphere of the Presidio.

In 1776 Spain named Monterey as the capital of the Pacific Empire (Baja and Alta California). Thus, in the same year that the Declaration of Independence was signed on the Atlantic Coast, Monterey became the center of Spanish activity on the Pacific coast.

This same year Captain Juan Bautista de Anza arrived from Tubac, Sonora (now S.E. Arizona) with the first settlers this extraordinary overland migration brought the first white women to the area. Five children were born during the six-month march and one woman died in childbirth. The first Spanish governor, Felipe de Neve, arrived soon thereafter.

In 1814 the Spanish Custom House was built. However, it was burned in 1818 by the French pirate Bouchard, along with a goodly portion of the Presidio and the

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town. In 1842 the United States established a consulate in Monterey and Thomas Larkin was appointed to be the first consul to represent the United States.

In April 1822 the Proclamation of the new Mexican Republic made the people of Monterey (and all California) accept rule by Mexico. The first Mexican governor did not arrive until 1825.

On July 2, 1846 the frigate Savannah, flagship of Commodore John Drake Sloat's fleet, sailed staunchly into the bustling port of Monterey, to join the two other American ships, the Cyane and the Levent. Five days later, on July 7th, the United States flag, bearing 28 stars, was the first time officially unfurled over the Mexican Custom House. A proclamation was read by Commodore Sloat, declaring the territory to be under the protection of the United States. A 21 gun salute boomed from the ships to the shore, and the era of Spanish and Mexican rule which had existed in California since 1770 was at an end.

When the American crew landed, Monterey had a population of about 1500 people. Yet this pueblo was the political and social center of an area which included not only all of California as we know it today, but also Nevada, Arizona and Utah, as well as the southwest portion of Wyoming and the western half of Colorado and New Mexico, approximately 600,000 square miles.

A few days later, Chaplain Walter Colton, U.S.N. arrived on board the U.S.S. Congress. Although, still a chaplain, he was appointed the first American Alcalde or chief judge of Monterey and the neighboring territory. With the consent of the Navy Department he held this office until the summer of 1849. During this time he established "The Californian," the first newspaper to be published in California, built its first school house and public building which was named "Colton Hall" in his honor. The first constitutional convention of the State of California was held here in 1849.

The Navy played an important part in the early history of California and still has an important role in modern Monterey.

GENERAL INFORMATION

INFORMATION FOR ENGINEERING SCHOOL STUDENTS

General. The mission of the Engineering School is "to provide for the advanced education and technical instruction of officer students as may be prescribed to meet the needs of the Navy." Most of the instruction is conducted by the civilian faculty under the Academic Dean. Arranging of curricula content, military and administrative supervision of students, and instruction in a few purely professional subjects, are the functions of the officers assigned to the Staff.

Curriculum. The word "curriculum" is defined as the entire planned program of formal study pursued by a student from enrollment to graduation. A curriculum is composed of one or more courses. The curriculum to which a student is assigned is stated in his orders. As part of the check-in procedure he will report to an "Officer in Charge of Curriculum." This O-in-C of Cur-riculum is his reporting senior during his period at the Postgraduate School and is the person to whom the student should turn for guidance, leave, special requests, etc. The O-in-C of Curriculum is interested personally in the welfare and progress of all officer students enrolled in the curricula for which he is responsible. In the Engineering School completion of a specific curriculm usually leads to the award of an academic degree.

Group and Section. For administrative purposes all officer students taking the same curriculum are collectively a "Group," which is given a letter designation to correspond with the "Group Designator" as listed in the catalogue under the specific curriculum. Groups are further divided into "Sections" as required for instruction. In some instances a Section includes an entire Group-in such instances the words are synonymous. The senior officer student in each Section is designated "Section Leader" and is responsible to the O-in-C of the Curriculum for such matters as muster reports, military conduct of the section during school hours, canvassing the section for charity drives, etc.

Instruction and Study. The level and methods of instruction are comparable to those in other graduate schools. Many officers will find that they have difficulty in establishing the efficient study habits which will be necessary to keep pace with the work load. The following suggestions are offered and may be helpful.

As soon as possible lay out a daily routine of study, sleep and recreation-stick to it as closely as possible.

Begin work promptly and concentrate. Have a clear conception of the course's objective. A brief review of previous assignments may assist in establishing continuity and coherence.

Arrange study conditions which are favorable.

For the convenience of students a routine of keeping school open on school nights and Saturday mornings is followed.

Your O-in-C of Curriculum is available to discuss difficulties and can assist in arrangements for special instruction or other assistance if such is indicated.

Academic Marks and Fitness Reports. Marks are assigned on an alphabetical scale, the details of which are described in the catalogue.

Academic achievement is of necessity reflected in fitness reports covering periods of instruction in the Engineering School. Every effort is made, however, to fully evaluate each officer individually as an officer in comparison with other officers of corresponding rank and experience. It is appreciated that selection for instruction usually requires well above average scholastic background and performance of professional duties as a naval officer.

Academic Degrees. The Superintendent of the Postgraduate School is authorized by law to grant advanced degrees and has been accredited to do so in several fields. All students in curricula leading to degrees are required to work toward that degree and with few exceptions those who fail to meet the requisite academic standards are not continued in their curriculum. The catalogue gives information in regard to regulations governing the award of degrees and indicates under each curriculum the academic degree which may be awarded.

Textbooks With a few exceptions all textbooks normally required by officer students will be provided by the School. Should a student desire to make notes in a textbook he should make arrangements with the library to purchase a personal copy. Most book purchases made through the School receive a discount. Watches. Students in the Engineering School may expect to stand an occasional security watch after school hours. In general, however, students are not ordered to any duty not connected with their assigned course of instruction.

INFORMATION FOR GENERAL LINE AND NAVAL SCIENCE SCHOOL STUDENTS

General

Summarized information is provided as ready reference for incoming students. This information is not all inclusive and if any questions arise, the Section Leader and Section Advisor, who hold copies of pertinent directives, will be prepared to answer them.

Programs

There are three programs in the General Line and Naval Science School:

(a) General Line Program is a 9½ month course of instruction in naval professional subjects designed to prepare line officers for more responsible duties in the operating forces.

(b) Bachelor of Science Program, and

(c) Bachelor of Arts Program; both supplement the Navy's five-term college training program. The length of each program varies from a minimum of three to a maximum of ten 10-week terms, depending upon the amount of acceptable advance credit the individual possesses on entry. (The Postgraduate School Catalogue contains information on the mission, tasks and organization of the school; a detailed explanation of the programs; curricula outlines; individual course descriptions and the exact dates of commencement of terms, registration and graduation.)

Organization

Students are organized into Classes, either Naval Science or General Line, which are further organized into Sections within each Class for the purpose of administration. Each Section is composed, insofar as practicable, of officers representive in rank, classification and and experience if the entire student body. The Senior Officer in each Section is the Section Leader. Members of the military instructional staff of the school are designated as Staff Section Advisors. A Senior Staff Advisor is designated as coordinator for each of the three Programs. As soon as the administrative check-in has been completed, students report to their Staff Section Advisors for academic screening, counseling and scheduling. Schedules tentatively arranged as a result of the evaluation of questionnaires are reviewed.

Standing of Students Who Are Absent For Extended Periods

Students who miss two weeks or less con-

secutively will usually be expected to complete the course in the normal period. In the event that a student misses more than two weeks consecutively, or more than three weeks in broken increments, the Director will decide whether the student will be rescheduled to complete the requred work.

Bulletin Boards

Each student section has a section bulletin board on the first floor of Building 221 on which muster sheets, directives, and other pertinent information will be posted. Students should check the section bulletin board at least once daily. In addition, the "School Bulletin Board" in the corridor below the entrance to the GL & NSS wing contains information of interest to all and should be checked frequently. Other bulletin boards have been established for such special purposes as Athletic and Recreational news, new library acquisitions, Academic Departmental or individual course information.

Survey Tests

General Survey Tests in communications skills and mathematics skills are given to all incoming students during registration week. The tests are designed to indicate individual strengths and weaknesses in the tested areas and the results are used in planning study programs. A schedule of the times and places for test administration will be made available to all students early during registration week.

Grades

Students will be assigned grades in all courses. The 3.0 quality point system is used to compute class standing. The final fitness report of each student will include a statement of his academic record. The following distribution will be approximated.

Outstanding — Top 10 percent Excellent — Next 40 percent Satisfactory — Remainder of class

In addition, the transcript of each student is forwarded to BUPERS upon completion of the course for file in his service record.

Fitness Reports

Upon the reporting of each new Class, a "Student Enrollment Notice" for each student is forwarded to BUPERS where it stands in lieu of regular fitness reports. The BUPERS Manual provides that "fitness reports on students shall be submitted at the end of the school year... provided intervals between reports do not exceed one year." Fitness reports are submitted to BUPERS upon detachment of General Line Program students. Fitness reports for students enrolled in the Naval Science Program will be submitted upon completion of the first nine months after the reporting date, upon completion of each year's period, and upon detachment at the end of the course.

The Section Leader initiates fitness reports on all U.S. members of his section. The Staff Section Advisor initiates fitness reports on the Section Leader and section members. They are then submitted to the Director, General Line and Naval Science School for final review and approval. Fitness reports are based on academic performance, and the observed qualities of leadership, moral character, integrity, responsibility, efficiency, work habits, judgement, conference performance, cooperation, public relations, ability to speak or write, ability to handle extra-curricular activities, contributions to the welfare and morale of the section, class or school, or any other observed qualities which would assist a reviewing board to evaluate an officer.

Name Tags

To facilitate identification, students wear name tags during their tour at the school and staff members wear name tags during the first three weeks of each new class input. Student name tags are available for purchase at the time of registration.

Watches

Officer students are assigned GL&NSS Duty Officer evening watches in Building 221. Each officer can expect to stand approximately one or two such watches during his academic tour. Students not flying when their sections are scheduled to fly stand classified study supervisor watches. Each such watch is of 2¹/₂ hours duration, and is stood in Room 415, Building 221.

Outside Study

The average amount of outside study 1s about one hour for each class hour. This amount of outside preparation varies with the individual. The student should set up a daily routine of study, sleep and recreation to be adhered to as closely as possible. The student should begin work promptly and concentrate on the subject matter, bearing in mind the objective of the course, reviewing where necessary previous assignments to establish continuity and coherence. Arrange study conditions which are favorable to concentration. Various study rooms and the Technical Library are available each weekday evening. Saturday morning and Sunday evening for those who desire to use them. Avoid excess studying at the expense of sufficient sleep. Keen attention during class will relieve the

burden of excess outside study requirements and will be more profitable to the students.

Study and Typing Rooms

Two Study Rooms and a Typing Room (Rooms 120, 122 and 415) are provided for use by students during the working day and during the time the General Line and Naval Science School Duty Officer is present in the building. Students who wish to remain after the Duty Officer leaves may assume responsibility for locking the room on their departure.

Library and Textbook Facilities

All students will be conducted on an indoctrination tour of the Reference Library facilities during Registration Week. Library cards should be obtained from the Reference Librarian in Root Hall before text materials are drawn.

The Registered Publications Custodian, whose office is in the basement of Herrmann Hall (Bldg. 220), issues all Registered Publications. Normal hours of operation of the office are from 0800 to 1200 and from 1300 to 1600 each working day. Students will be required to present identification cards when drawing RPS publications. Instructions for the correction of RPS publications are contained in a GL&NSS Instruction.

Classified non-RPS (Code 4) publications are issued by the Technical Publications Librarian (under the cognizance of the Supply Department) whose office is located in the basement of Herrmann Hali (Bldg. 220). Normal hours of operation of the issue room are from 1000 to 1400 on working days. A library card is required for drawing Code 4 Publications. Instructions for correcting and page-checking Code 4 Publications are contained in a GL&NSS Instruction.

Unclassified textbooks are distributed through the Textbook Issue Room (under the cognizance of the Supply Department) located in the basement of Herrmann Hall (Bldg. 220). Normal hours of operation are from 1000 to 1400 on working days. A library card is required for drawing textbooks.

Section Leaders will draw a copy of PGS Instruction 5000.3 (effective edition) from the Reference Library and a copy of OPNAV Instruction 5510.1 (effective edition), the Security Manual for Classified Information, from the Textbook Issue Room for the use of the members of their sections.

Locker Assignments

Individual lockers for storage of textbooks and other academic materials are assigned by the Administrative Officer Lockers are located in Building 221 as follows:

Students must provide their own padlocks which must be of the three-combination type with all manufacturer's numbers removed. A grinding wheel is available in room 415. Lockers assigned to each student must be kept locked except during the time the student is stowing or removing material. Obtain padlock before drawing textbooks and publications.

Slide Rules and Mathematics Handbooks

All officer students in the Naval Science Program are required to own and have available for use in their course:

1. One slide rule 10 inch or longer, Log-log Trig, or better. (Suitable slide rules are available at the Navy Exchange).

2. One mathematics handbook of a type approved by the Mathematics Department. Officers already owning handbooks upon reporting should present them to their first mathematics instructor for determination of their suitability. The Mathematics Department will assist officers who do not have suitable handbooks upon reporting in obtaining a suitab' handbook at a reasonable rate.

Instructors

It is most important to develop a harmonious instructor-section relationship. Students, regardless of rank, are expected to do their part; the instructor must, of necessity, be in charge in the classroom. While standardization is sought, some instructors may vary in some respects with regard to details of classroom procedure. The Section Leader must display, by his cooperation, a standard of conduct for the student to follow.

Smoking in Classrooms

Smoking will not be permited in formal lectures or in any classroom during normal recitation or lecture periods. With the approval of the instructor, smoking may be permitted (a) in classrooms during regular assigned examinations or quizzes when the allotted duration is in excess of fifty (50) minutes, and (b) during laboratory experiments and during certain computational periods.

In all cases, either during examinations, quizzes or in laboratories, where smoking is permitted it is the responsibility of the **individual concerned** to provide proper containers and make proper disposal of ashes and cigarette butts.

Athletics

To promote physical fitness, an intramural athletic program is conducted at the GL&NSS.Competition by sections in such sports as softball, volleyball, bowling and golf provides an excellent opportunity for all officer students to participate in recreational activities outside of school hours. A point system has been devised and the section having the highest total point score based on league wins and play-offs is awarded the "Iron Man," a perpetual trophy of the General Line and Naval Science School. Individual prizes are also awarded. The intramural schedule, together with information as to rules, scoring, etc., are promulgated to all officers early in the first term by GL&NSS Directive. Each Section will have an athletic representative on the Athletic Commitee who will assist the General Line and Naval Science School Athletic Officer in organizing and supervising the athletic program at the School.

Promotions

Results of promotion selection boards are normally received by the school by message soon after they are released in the Navy Department. Copies of these messages are posted for the information of all as promptly as possible. Individual notification of selection is **not** made. Detailed instructions for completion of promotion requirements (i.e. physical examination and certification of completion of professional requirements) will be issued to all selectees shortly after selection lists are received.

Promotions are delivered to students by the Director or the Assistant Director. Individuals will be notified as soon as promotions are received.

Orders to Next Duty

The Bureau of Naval Personnel is kept advised of the prospective graduation date of all students. It is the responsibility of the individual student to insure that a current Officer Preference Card h as been submitted to BUPERS. In addition, the Assignment Section of the Bureau welcomes personal letters of the declarative type; that is, those which **do not** require a reply.

In general, students may expect that their orders will be received at the school from one to three months prior to the graduation date. An information copy of each student's orders will be delivered to the individual as soon as they are received (this is normally accomplished within one hour of the receipt of the orders whether by mail or message.) Students are asked to refrain from inquiring about the receipt of orders. Additional copies of orders (for shipment of household effects, etc.) will be furnished without further action on the part of the individual.

Detachment

The day of graduation is also the date of detachment for all students unless otherwise specified in individual BUPERS orders. Proceed time is normally written into orders to allow the individual time for such personal matters as packing, moving, and the like. It is recognized, however, that in a few cases detachment on the graduation day would result in undue hardship for the officer or his dependents (e.g. conflicts with the end of an older child's school term). In such cases, the Director will give consideration to a written request for a detachment date of up to ten days before or after the graduation date but not prior to the student's last scheduled examination.

INFORMATION FOR MANAGEMENT SCHOOL STUDENTS

Mission

The mission of the Navy Management School is to provide graduate education for Naval officers in the theories, philosophies, and application of scientific methods of Management in order to advance efficiency and economy of operation in the Navy, afloat and ashore.

General

The ten-month Navy Management Curriculum provides instruction at the graduate level in the functional areas of management integrated into a "core" of required courses comprising about 80 per cent of the total curriculum credit hours. All officers are required to take the "core" courses. These courses provide the foundation and tools of Management and lead into the electives given during the third and fourth terms. The elective courses offer moderate flexibility to meet the interests of the individual officer and provide limited specialization in fields of interest to the various supporting agencies. A degree, Master of Science in Management, is awarded to successful candidates upon completion of the course of study. The current Catalogue of the U. S. Naval Postgraduate School should be consulted for detailed information concerning the courses offered.

The instruction is conducted by highly qualified civilian professors and Naval officers, using classroom lecture, case study, and seminar dicussion. Throughout, the course stresses development of the officer's ability in problem solving and expressing his thoughts concisely and meaningfully in oral and written work. Students are encouraged in the discussion of management subjects outside the classroom setting to stimulate the interchange of ideas with classmates with specialized knowledge and varied experience.

The curriculum is scheduled over four ten-week terms to give each officer student a load of approximately 17 class hours a week. In the latter part of the course a three-day field trip is scheduled to military or civilian industrial activities in order to acquaint the officer with the applications of management principles and to provide the officers the opportunity to discuss with higher level managers the problems of day-to-day management.

Organization

Students are organized into sections of approximately twenty officers for administrative purposes, with the senior officer of each section serving as Section Leader. Each section is representative of a crosssection of code designators and experience of the entire class.

Summer School

A short course of approximately four weeks duration in Elements of Management is given during the summer months. Quotas for attendance at this course are controlled by the Bureau of Naval Personnel. Detailed information as to the curriculum is contained in the annual U. S. Naval Postgraduate School Catalogue.

INFORMATION for NAVAL AVIATORS

General. The Naval Air Facility, Monterey, is located about two miles by road from the Postgraduate School. The Commanding Officer reports to the Superintendent, U. S. Naval Postgraduate School, for additional duty in connection with the maintenance of flight proficiency of all naval aviators attached to the Naval Postgraduate School.

Aviation Officer. The Aviation Officer is a naval aviator attached to the Staff of the Postgraduate School. He assists the CO, NAF in flight scheduling and maintains the close liaison necessary for smooth operations. Information and directives of interest to student naval aviators are distributed through his office.

Naval Aviators Reporting for Duty. Aviators upon reporting for duty are required to report to the Flight Surgeon at the NAF for medical clearance prior to flying as a pilot. Pilots cannot ground themselves for physical reasons but must instead report to the Flight Surgeon for examination. Once grounded for medical reasons, an aviator is not permitted to fly again until properly cleared by the Flight Surgeon.

The Training Officer at the NAF, Monterey, handles pilot qualifications and required releases pertinent to aviators as well as initiating all flight schedules for Postgraduate School Aviators.

Naval Aviator Students' Flight Organization. In order to facilitate scheduling for flying, Flight Wings approximately equal in size are formed. Students are assigned to wings by the respective Directors of their Schools. The senior naval aviator of each wing is designated Wing Commander. The senior naval aviator of the other Line School Sections and Engineering School Groups which comprise the wing are designated Senior Aviators. Wings are scheduled to fly one-half day per week. When so scheduled, the Wing Commander musters the wing at the Air Facility at the designated time.

Weather Factor. When flying is not possible due to weather or other causes, the Commanding Officer of the Naval Air Facility may retain the students at the field for part or all of the scheduled period if he so desires and provide suitable employment (i.e. link training, lectures, etc.) other than flight.

Minimum Proficiency Flight Requirements: Attention of student aviators is directed to the current OPNAV Instructions regarding minimum-maximum flight requirements. The annual Minimum-Maximum Individual Pilot proficiency requirements prescribed by OPNAV Instructions are: Min. Max.

- (5) Instrument Time each
 - six months10

The above requirements are for Category I pilots.

Instrument Qualifications. OPNAV Instructions require that all Group I aviators maintain a valid instrument card. Aviators having instrument cards which will expire within 60 days after reporting to the Postgraduate School should renew their cards prior to reporting.

Aviation Bulletin Board. The Aviation Officer maintains Aviation Bulletin Boards outside his office in the East Wing Bldg., 221, and on the lower floor of Spanagel and Root Halls. Naval Aviators attached to the Postgraduate School are expected to take cognizance of such matter as is posted on these boards. Additional matter of interest may also be posted in the Student Pilots' Ready Room at the Air Facility.

Flight Clothing. The Supply Officer, NAF, will issue flight clothing and will assist officers in formal surveys of flight gear when required. There is no flight clothing pool for temporary issue of flight clothing.

Flying time Reports. These reports are required at the end of each fiscal year and when a change of status with regard to DIFOT occurs. The report is submitted to the Aviation Officer.

UNIFORM INFORMATION

UNIFORM OF THE DAY FOR STAFF:

From April through October the Uniform of the Day for Staff is Service Dress Khaki except special events, evening functions and watch standing in which cases variation of Service Dress Blue Bravo may be specified. In addition, Service Dress Blue Bravo is an optional uniform during this period.

From April through October the Uniform of the Day for Staff is Service Dress Khaki. This includes watch standing but not special events or evening functions in which cases variation of Service Dress Blue Bravo may be specified.

Uniform of the Day

Except on special occasions when students are required to wear the uniform of the day as indicated above, students are authorized to wear civilian clothes commencing with the first day of class. The uniform of the day is required during registration week.

MISCELLANEOUS STUDENT INFORMATION

The School Day

The school day for all schools consists of nine 50 minute periods, Monday thru Friday, with the first period commencing at 0810 and the last period ending at 1700. A lunch period is provided in the middle of the day. Officer students are not normally required to be at the school outside of instruction periods which they are scheduled to attend.

Attendance and Mustering

Attendance at all scheduled classes, lectures. flight periods or other curricular events is the responsibility of the individual officer student. A muster is required by all schools although the system varies with each.

Student Illnesses


An officer too ill to attend his scheduled classes must arrange to be seen by a medical officer on the first day he is absent. If able to do so, he should present himself at the Dispensary at either the Postgraduate School Sick Call Room or the Naval Air Facility, but he must as a minimum contact the Dispensary by telephone. It is also advisable to keep the Section Leader and O-in-C of Curriculum informed.

Absence

Absence from classes is not authorized at any time. Permission must be obtained from the O-inC or Curriculum or Section Advisor as appropriate for absence from specific classes.

Leave

Officer students are granted only emergency leave during the regular academic year. Normally, regular leave may be taken during intersessional periods and the Christmas holidays. Out-of-bounds passes are required to go beyond prescribed geographical limits.

REPORTING IN

Officers reporting in should report at the Quarterdeck which is located just inside the Main entrance of Herrmann Hall. From here they are directed to the Military Personnel Office where orders are turned in for endorsement and "check-in sheets" issued. Personnel reporting aboard N.A.F. will check in with the OOD at the quarterdeck, located in building 1. (See map.).

GOVERNMENT QUARTERS

Bachelor Officer Quarters are available. A Commissioned Officers' Mess Closed, is operated under the BOQ Officer. There are NO government quarters within the BOQ available for occupancy by the dependents of officer students. Information on housing in the Monterey Area may be found by checking the index.

B. O. Q. at NAF

A very limited number of rooms are available to bachelor officers and transients. The B. O. Q. is located above the dispensary in building number 3. The rooms are primarily intended for transients, but are often occupied by bachelor officers attached to the station. Bachelor officers eat at the General Mess.

DISBURSING FACILITIES

General: The Disbursing Office is open for business from 0800 to 1630 Monday through Friday.

Special Pay: Special pay is available for justified reasons as follows:

0800-1200 1300-1400

No special pay during the five (5) working days before payday. All special payments will be approved by the Commanding Officer, Administrative Command or such other officers he may designate.

Exceptions: No special payment made between 1300-1400 on paydays and last working day of each month.

Regular pay days: Regular pay days are held on the last day and 15th of each month, or, if such days fall on weekends or holidays, on the next working day or such other day as the Commanding Officer, Administrative Command may designate. Flight Pay: Those flight certificates presented to this office by the Naval Air Facility Operations Officer prior to five (5) working anys before the middle of the month payday will be included in that payday check.

Allotments: Registration of allotments is accomplished during working hours from the 2nd through the 20th of each month, less the middle of the month payday.

Travel Claims: Travel Claims are accepted for payment during any working day at the transportation section of the office. Claims are processed in one day. However, during rush periods when new classes are convening, one to two weeks are often necessary to process a claim.

BANKING FACILITIES

The Bank of America National Trust and Savings Association maintains a banking facility which is located immediately inside the Main Entrance of Herrmann Hall. This facility is administered by the Monterey Branch of the Bank of America and is equipped to handle any banking transaction with exception of granting loans. Banking hours are 1000-1500 daily except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays. Persons attached to NAF may find it more convenient to utilize the Banks in Seaside or Monterey.

HOUSEHOLD GOODS

Personnel whose household goods have been consigned to this command, or storage in this locality should inform the Household Goods Division of the Supply and Fiscal Department as soon as possible as to desired disposition. Since recent changes in instructions have been made, the following detailed information may be of interest:

- (a) Express shipments consigned to this command are received and held by the Household Goods Division. They may be picked up by the owners without prior notice during regular working hours, or will be delivered to resience on 24 hour notice.
- (b) Freight, except that consigned direct to the owner's residence, are placed in authorize government storage with local contractors. Delivery and unpacking services for such goods must be arranged through the Household Goods Division. The owner is entitled to delivery and unpacking service for his complete shipment at one time. Delivery can normally be effected Monday through Friday. However, requests for delivery must be made at least 24 hours in advance of delivery date. It is suggested that owners not request a delivery date via letter

or phone call while en route to this area. Unless the owner is present at the delivery address on the requested date, additional costs will be assessed the owner for waiting time and redelivery charge.

- (c) Deliveries direct to residence. Advance arrangements for immediate acceptance of household goods from the carrier at destination are the responsibility of the owner. The owner is responsible for any demurrage, unauthorized storage, or other charges incurred because correct delivery address was not furnished or because shipment was not accepted promptly from the carrier by owner or his authorized agent. For military personnel planning to obtain Government quarters (La Mesa Village), it is advised that the management will not act as agent for the acceptance of household goods consigned to La Mesa Village.
- (d) Storage. A recent change in the Joint Travel Regulations states that a member is entitled to temporary storage at government expense for a period of ninety days in connection with any authorized shipment of household goods. In any case when household goods are not removed from storage before expiration of the initial ninety day period, all storage charges accruing after expiration of the initial ninety day period will be borne by the member unless additional storage is authorized. In the event household goods cannot be withdrawn within the initial ninety day period, it is requested the member contact the Household Goods Branch for further information concerning expansion of storage for an additional ninety day period. Withdrawal of partial lots of household goods from temporary storage at government expense is not authorized. However, a member may withdraw a part of his household goods from temporary storage upon payment of all costs of access and removal without thereby forfeiting his right to continue temporary storage and ultimate delivery of the remainder of his household goods. The Household Goods Branch should be contacted prior to arranging withdrawals.

It is advised that all military personnel ordered to this command to pursue a course of instruction in excess of twenty (20) weeks, and who will occupy partially furnished quarters, request non-temporary storage at point of origin for that portion of household goods which will not be needed during the course of instruction. The reader is referred to the housing section of this brochure for details on public quarters.

The U. S. Naval Postgraduate School, Monterey, California, handles shipments of household goods for personnel assigned to the U. S. Naval Reserve Training Center, Monterey, California, and the U. S. Naval Air Facility, Monterey, California, and its components, and for personnel residing in an area not to exceed sixty (60) consecutive miles from Monterey, California. This area includes the cities of Santa Cruz, Soquel, Watsonville, San Martin, Gilroy, San Juan Bautista, Hollister, Castroville, Salinas, Chualar, Gonzales, Soledad, Pacific Grove, Seaside, Carmel and Monterey, California.

The Commissary Annex is open from 0930 to 1730 on Monday for items in short supply such as bread, milk, butter, eggs, coffee and items for quick meals. The Annex is also open from 1100 to 1730, Tuesday through Friday and from 0930 to 1400 on Saturday for express service on the above items.

Located in the Supply Building. Open Tuesdays, Thursdays and paydays from 0930 to 1130.

NAVY NURSERY SCHOOL

A Navy Nursery School is located at Building 25, Naval Air Facility, FRontier 5-7562. It is a non-profit organization operated by an Executive Commitee elected by the parents who have children enrolled. Current hours of operation are 0745 to 1230 daily, Monday through Friday except holidays. Tuition is \$18.00 per month for the first child of a family, less for additional children. Applications, copies of the constitution and by-laws, etc., are available from the Committee.

RECREATION - ATHLETIC FACILITIES

In addition to civilian facilities of the area (notably three outstanding golf courses) the following are available for military personnel, dependents and other eligible persons. Postgraduate School movies: One showing at 1945 on Tuesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays in King Hall, building 237. Cost 15 cents per person. Uniform of the day or in appropriate civilian dress which for all male persons over twelve includes a coat. The movie schedule is posted in the Plan of the Day and Weekly in the Schedule of Events" (PGS Notice 5050) available at the Student Mail Center and the Special Services Office.

NAF Movies

One showing at 1930 on Saturday, Sunday and Wednesday in the NAF Auditorium. Cost is 15 cents per person. Children under 12 are admitted for 10 cents. Uniform of the day is required for all non-rated personnel. The movie for the day is printed in the Plan of the Day and the Movie Schedule is published every two weeks in the NAF Press.

Barbecue pits are reserved on a first come first serve basis at the Special Services Office of the Postgraduate School.

Bowling

Naval Air Facility: Four alleys are available equiped with AMF automatic pinsetters. Cost is 25 cents a line with shoes and balls free. The hours of operation are 1100 to 2300 everyday with the exception Sunday when the alley operates from 1300 to 2300.

Fort Ord: Open 1700 to 2200, 12 alleys, 25 cents a line. Shoes rented, 10 cents.

Monterey Bowl: 2161 Fremont St., Open 24 hours, 8 alleys, 45 to 50 cents a line. League game after 1700. Shoes rented, 20 cents.

Rancho Bowl: Grand Avenue, Pacific Grove. Open daily 1200 to 2400, 10 alleys, 40 to 45 cents a line. Shoes rented, 15 cents.

Cypress Bowl: 2450 Fremont, Monterey. Open 24 hours, 24 alleys (automatic), 40 to 50 cents a line. League bowling after 1900 but 2 to 8 alleys available. Shoes rented, 20 cents.

Hunting and Fishing

Hunting and fishing information regarding the Los Padres National Forest Area can be obtained by contacting the Fish and Game Commission, at Hunter Liggett Military Reservation or from the Postgraduate School Special Services Office. Special Services has available five shotguns, 12 gauge automatic on a reserved basis.

Pool, Billiards, Snooker

One table on the third deck of the Administration Building for Officers; one table in the CPO Quarters for Chief Petty Officers and one table at Crew's Barracks. Two tables at NAF.

Ping Pong Table

One table in the Swimming Pool Area; one table in the Issue Room, Building 209 and one in E. M. Club. One table at NAF.

Badminton

One outdoor court in the swimming pool area. Another indoor court located at NAF in the Auditorium

Handball

One wall court beside the swimming pool and an enclosed court at the Naval Air Facility.

Squashball

One court available at the Naval Air Fac. This is the same as the handball court.

Hobby Shop

Located in the Special Services Building at NAF the hobby shop supports both NAF and Postgraduate School. The auto shop operates everyday from 1300 to 2200 Weekends it closes at 2100. The carpenter shop is open weekdays only from 1300 to 2200. Available at the Recreation Gear

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Issue Room, Special Services Building, are the following items: golf clubs, badminton sets, volley balls, footballs, softball equipment, fishing rods and reels of various types. Camping equipment and trailers are also available at no charge. A signed receipt is required for all items.

Archery Range

One target is available at the Golf Driving Range. At the Monterey Fairgrounds on Tuesday Nights, free instruction is given by the Monterey Peninsula Archers. For information call FRontier 2-8914.

Basketball Courts

Double Court located opposite the Boiler House behind the Crews' Barracks and a half court next to the gasoline service station at the Postgraduate School. One outdoor court is located at NAF near the bowling alley.

Gym Equipment

Located in Building 209, Postgraduate School, behind the swimming pool. Hours Monday thru Friday from 1230 to 1630 for military personnel. Pulley-weight, chest weights, rowing machine, striking bag and bicycle trainer are available. Facilities are also available at NAF, Fort Ord and Army Presidio.

Volleyball

Two courts located at the Golf Driving Range; one court at the Picnic Grounds and two courts are located behind the Boiler House. These courts are on the basketball court with removable uprights.

Softball

Four diamonds are located at the Golf Driving Range and one diamond behind the Disbursing Office.

Recreation Athletics

The Special Services Department Athletic Director and Coach is available at the Postgraduate School to coordinate, instruct and coach intermural sports. He should be contacted also in regard to basketball, baseball, football, volleyball, swimming, tennis, pistol, skeet, rifle shooting, and other competive sports.

Recreation Equipment

Available at the Recreation Gear Issue Room Building 209 Postgraduate School, located at the swimming pool are the following items on a weekly basis: Tennis rackets, golf clubs, badminton sets, handball gloves and balls, volleyballs, footballs, softball equipment, water skis, clam rakes, fishing rods and reels of all types. Camping equipment, tents, sleeping bags, cots, ice chests, camp stools, axes, Coleman stoves and lanterns, (but no air mattresses or thermos jugs).

For a \$2.00 per day fee with a two day limit, the following items may be rented:

Power lawn mower, outboard motors (Sea King), and gasoline portable chain saw. The renter will be charged for repairs; all items are inspected for damage, and are to be cleaned and flushed prior to returning.

The following special items are available for one day issuance and may be reserved in advance: 25 to 50 cup electric percolator, 110 volt Skilsaw, one 110 volt Sabre saw and one electric portable buffer. Receiver is responsible for all damages.

NAF Pistol Range

North of East end of runway. Open during normal working hours and on weekends to range card holders. Range cards are issued by Security and Ordnance Officers after a checkout on range procedures. A minimum of two people on the range is required. Range is reserved for for NAF pistol and rifle teams on Tuesday and Thursday afternoon from 1400 to 1630.

PRIVATELY OWNED VEHICLES

Personnel attached to the Postgraduate School who desire to operate a motor vehicle within the grounds are required to register it at the Police Station, Herrmann Hall, located immediately inside main entrance. Proof of minimum insurance coverage is required. (\$10,000-\$20,000 liability and \$5,000 property damage). Traffic regulations are issued at the time of registration and must be observed. Motorcycles are not permitted on the grounds of the Postgraduate School.

NAF REGULATIONS FOR PRIVATELY OWNED VEHICLES:

Same as Postgraduate School regulations. Parking stickers should be obtained at NAF Security Office in Administration Building. Motorcycles may be parked in T-Lot.

PARKING

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Certain parking spaces in all areas at the Postgraduate School are numbered, and reserved for the use of the person to whom assigned. Additional parking spaces are provided thruout the grounds for the use of others. Personnel are encouraged to form driving squads. Parking areas are indicated on the station map.

DIVINE WORSHIP

A Roman Catholic and Protestant Chaplain are assigned respectively to the Postgraduate School and the Naval Air Facility. Each Chaplain is available to personnel attached to either command. MEDICAL SERVICES

The Naval Medical facilities available consist of a 3 bed dispensary located in building number 3, Naval Air Facility, and a staff of 4 medical officers, 2 nurses and approximately 25 hospital corpsmen. The primary function of the dispensary is to provide medical care for active duty personnel of the Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard. An out-patient department is maintained to provide additional care of bona fide dependents. No fac'lities are available at the dispensary for in-patient care of dependents. The Fort Ord Army Hospital provides in-patient and consultation services for both military and dependen personnel. All cases must be referred by the Naval Dispensary except for emer-gencies. Postgraduate School instruction 6320. 1B applies to regulations governing dependents medical care.

Emergency Treatment

Emergency treatment is provided by the main dispensary on a 24 hour basis. An emergency is defined as an illness or injury which is a threat to life. Fever is not an emergency. Dependents must telephone FR 2-8096 prior to reporting to the dispensary in all other cases.

Ambulance Service

a. Military-Upon request.

b. Dependents---No ambulance service is available for dependents except in grave emergencies. Contact the Medical Officer for advice.

Drugs. X-Rays, Laboratory

Facilities are available to compound medications which are standard Navy stock. Civilian will be filled within the capability of the pharmacy for Navy stock items only. During regular working hours. Civilian prescriptions requiring narcotics cannot be filled.

Physical Examinations

Officers—0900 daily except Friday. Enlisted—0900 Friday.

Dependents — Upon request consistent with work load in the clinic. (Patients with illnesses will be given priority). FR 2-8097 for appontments.

DENTAL SERVICE

Dental Quarters are located on the 4th floor of Herrmann Hall. Limited dental services are available at the NAF. All personnel reporting for duty are given a dental examination and scheduled for any necessary treatment. Dental Sick Call is held daily on working days except between 0800 and 1000. Emergencies will be seen at any time.

EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES

EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES

The Monterey Peninsula area has adequate educational facilities for the dependents of Naval Personnel. These include a two-year junior college with day and evening courses comparable to those of the University of California.

Public schools on the Monterey Peninsula are under three separate administrations: Monterey Public Schools, Pacific Grove and Carmel Unified School Districts.

MONTEREY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

A variety of educational services are offered to all age groups through Monterey

Public Schools' central administration. which includes two separate school districts in a coordinated program of kindergarten through junior college:

Elementary, Kindergarten thru Grade 6. Junior High School, Grades 7-8-9. Senior High School, Grades 10-12 Junior College, Grades 13-14.

Monterey City School District has fourteen elementary schools, kindergarten through grade 6, in the communities of Monterey, Del Rey Oaks, Seaside, and Fort Ord, plus administration of the Monterey Child Care Center.

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Monterey Child Care Center—542 Archer Street, Monterey. This is for pre-school children of working parents, and is operated with state funds and parent payments. Details of eligibility and registration may be obtained at the school.

Kindergarten Through Grade 6

Bay View School, Prescott at Belden Sts., Monterey; Thomas O. Larkin School, Scott and Watson Streets, Monterey; Monte Vis-ta School, Soledad Drive, Monterey; Oak Grove School, First and Park Streets, Monterey; Del Monte School, 222 Casa Verde, Monterey; La Mesa School, Sylvan Road; La Mesa Village, Monterey; Seaside School, 1491 Contra Costa Street, Seaside; Noche Buena School, 1450 Elm Street, Sea-side; Del Rey Woods School, Noche Buena and Plumas Streets, Seaside; Juan Cabrillo School, 1295 LaSalle Avenue, Seaside; Ord Terrace School, 1755 LaSalle Avenue, Seaside; Fort Ord School, Coe and Napier, Bay View Park, Monterey (on Fort Ord reservation, for children of Army personnel only); Joseph W. Stilwell School, Nor-mandy Road, Stilwell Park, Fort Ord (for children of Army personnel only). Highland School, Highland and Sonoma streets Seaside.

Beginning with the 1960-61 school year, the junior high schools will include grades 7-8-9 and will be operated by the Monterey Union High School District.

Junior High Schools

Walter Colton Junior High School, Via Gayuba, Monterey; Fremont Junior High School, 1060 Kimball Avenue, Seaside; Roger S. Fitch Junior High School, North-South Road, Fort Ord, (this third junior high school should be constructed and ready for occupancy during the 1961-62 school year).

Monterey Union High School District will include junior high school grades 7-8-9 beginning 1960-61, and will continue operation of senior high school and junior college through grade 14 until July 1, 1961 at which time the Monterey Peninsula College District is activated. This district coverthe Monterey City School District area (with Monterey, Del Rey Oaks, Seaside, and Fort Ord), plus elementary school districts of Marina, Palo Colorado, and Captain Cooper (Big Sur).

Monterey Union High School, Herrmann Drive, Monterey. Grades 10-11-12, plus some vocational evening classes for adults.

Monterey Peninsula College, Fremont Extension, Monterey, Junior college grades 13 and 14, day and evening divisions are offered for credit or audit. Lower division work is comparable to that offered by the University of California and acceptable for transfer there or to other four-year California universities without loss of credit. Junior college is open to all high school graduates and to any adults age 18 or over. The Associate of Arts Degree may be earned after two years of lower division credits, either university transfer or terminal courses.

Monterey Peninsula College periodically offers upper division extension courses for adults, and has a series of community interest programs of lectures, theater art film forums, and critiques open to the public.

Cafeteria Service is provided to all Monterey Public Schools excepting small neighborhood elementary schools: Thomas O. Larkin and Oak Grove in Monterey; Juan Cabrillo in Seaside.

Registration. This includes recording of family names, health histories, and an emergency telephone number. Supplies of registration cards and papers are available at the Housing Office for your convenience, or they may be obtained in the school office. Parents are asked to accompany elementary children to school the first day.

Elementary grade children, kindergarten through grade 6, are to be registered at the nearest elementary school. Junior high school students who live west of the Naval Postgraduate School (including La Mesa Village, Del Monte Fairways, and all parts of Monterey) attend the Walter Colton Junior High School. Junior high school students who live east of the Naval Postgraduate School, outside the Monterey City limits and along the Salinas Highway, attend the Fremont Junior High School. High school and junior college students should register at the school office.

Kindergarten and First Grade Age Requirements. California law requires that kindergarten children be four years and nine months old as of September I. First grade pupils must be five years and nine months of age as of September 1, although they may be admitted to first grade if they already have had a complete year of kindergarten elsewhere. Verification of birthdate must be provided, such as birth certificate, baptismal record, or insurance policy.

Federally-Connected Reports sent parents periodically should be answered promptly so that school districts can obtain federal funds for operational costs under Public Law 874, and construction and equipment monies under Public Law 815.

School Sessions:

Kindergarten children are assigned either to morning or afternoon classes. Some elementary grades are on half-day session, morning or afternoon, but regular session elementary grades take up at 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 and again at 1:00 p. m. to closing hour. Grades 1-2 are out at 2:00 p. m.; grade 3 is out at 2:30 p. m.; and grades 4-5-6 are out at 3:30 p. m.—all subject to adjustment in some classes.

Junior high school (grades 7-8) will be on half-day sessions, either morning or afternoon, during 1960-61 (when grade 9 is added to the junior high program). Full day sessions will commence with the 19" 62 school year.

Senior high school (grades 9-12). The high school will be on regular session during 1960-61 (after grade 9 is transferred to the junior high program).

Junior college programs vary widely, maintaining day and evening divisions.

Transportation: School bus transportation is provided for children who live beyond walking distance of the age and grade. Details of this service may be discussed with the school principal.

School Supplies: Textbooks and all other school supplies are provided, kindergarten through high school. Suitable gymnasium clothing should be provided by parents for all students grade 7 and up.

Name Identification: It is suggested that all jackets, sweaters, rain boots and similar outside clothing be labeled with the child's name—especially in kindergarten and primary grades.

Curriculum and Guidance. Monterey Public Schools' educational program is adapted to the needs and abilities of individual students, within and beyond the state framework of required instruction. In addition to the traditional 3-R skills of reading, writing, and arithematic, local schools offer training in citizenship, health and safety, science, history and government, art and music. Vocational and avocational courses are added at upper grades.

Homework is required according to the child's grade and need, increasing in length and difficulty progressively over the years. Progress reports are made quarterly. Parent-conferences are scheduled at least once a year in elementary and junior high schools, so that home and school may work together for the best interests of the child.

Monterey Public Schools' guidance program offers individual assistance in personality adjustment and character development. Counselors also are provided to help students select courses and plan vocational careers.

Welcome. Parents are invited to meet their child's teacher and the school principal, and to visit the schools at any time. Special visiting days are also announced.

Parent-Teacher Associations. (Elementary and junior and senior high school). You are cordially invited to join the Parent-Teacher Association unit at your child's school. The principal will announce the meeting dates.

Office of the Superintendent of Schools, Board of Education. Most of the information or assistance you need can be obtained through the school principal. In some instances, you may need to refer to the Superintendent of Schools' office in the Board of Education Building, 700 Pacific Street, The mailing address is P. O. Monterey. Box 1031, Monterey. You are invited to attend meetings of the Board of Education (elementary) and Board of Trustees (high school and junior college) held jointly in the Board of Education Building, the third Monday of each month at 8:00 p.m. Other meetings for business or study are announced through press and radio, and all board meetings are open to the public.

Bus Service. In general, busses pick up kindergarten through second grade students living ¾ of mile or beyond the nearest school; grade 3 through 6 students living one mile or beyond the nearest school; no bus service available for junior high or high school students.

Registration. Registration blanks are available at the Pacific Grove schools. Students should be registered prior to the opening day of school in September.

Age requirements. State law requires that kindergarten children be four years and nine months of age as of September 1. First grade students must be at least five years and nine months of age. Legal verification of birth date must be provided for kindergarten and first grade children.

Registration. Parents are requested to accompany children the first day to asisst in registration which includes health history, record of immunization shots and an emergency telephone number.

Age requirements. State law requires that kindergarten children be four years and nine months of age as of September 1. First grade students must be at least five years and nine months old. Legal verification of birth date must be provided for kindergarten and first grade children.

Suggestion. All jackets, sweaters, etc., should be labeled with child's name.

Miscellaneous Information. Two welcome and orientation meetings are held annally; these are in the fall and early spring and are held for parents new to the district.

A handbook for prospective high school students will be sent upon request or may be picked up at the Carmel High School Office.

Public schools must keep a record of all federallyconnected pupils on a prescribed form. These forms will also be available in the Housing Office.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR TEACHERS

The Monterey Peninsula offers many opportunities for full-time or substitute teaching. Qualified persons are encouraged to apply for teaching positions in the public schools of the area. Salaries vary beyond a state minimum, depending upon training and experience of the teacher. Substitutes are paid a flat daily rate.

California requires public school teachers to have a teaching credential issued by the California State Department of Education, Credentials Office, State Education Building, 721 Capitol Avenue, Sacramento 14, California. Application forms may be obtained from the Credentials Office.

Miscellaneous Information About the Monterey Area Housing

General

As with most new assignments you are probably vitally interested in the place in which you and your family will live. As a corollary, you probably and correctly surmise that obtaining exactly what you need or desire will be difficult. The Montercy Peninsula is a fast growing resort area with three large military installations: the Postgraduate School with a military population of about 1500, Fort Ord with 27,000, and the Army Language School with 2100. The above, all combine to increase the demand for housing and consequently raise the rental and purchase prices of all available dwellings. There are not sufficient public quarters available for all personnel at the Postgraduate School and applications must be submitted in advance for establishment of waiting lists. BOQ facilities are available for the majority of authorized personnel. In view of the foregoing, you are strongly advised not to bring your family to Monterey until you have secured a place to live. It is recognized that in some cases, such as enforced vacating of public quarters at your last duty station, moving your dependents may be necessary. The information in the following paragraphs may be helpful. Visiting the area yourself to make advance arrangements is advised whenever practicable.

Temporary Housing

If you choose to bring your family to the area while awaiting housing you have already secured or to look for housing, there are numerous motels, both new and old. Space in these is usually available, but there are times during the summer, particularly on weekends, when you may find even motel space hard to rent. Rates run from \$6 to \$15 per night for doubles or \$10 to \$20 for a three bedroom cottage for six people. The above quoted rates will vary according to the luxuriousness of the accommodations and the season. Some places are available at weekly rates varying from \$30 to \$60.

Public Quarters

There are 458 sets of Public Quarters located one and one-half miles from the Postgraduate School in La Mesa Village. Married enlisted personnel are assigned 53 units (50 three bedroom—1bath, 2 three bedroom-2 baths, and 1 four bedroom-2 baths), and married officers 405 units (62 two bedroom-1 bath, 206 three bedroom-1 bath, 20 three bedroom-2 baths, 30 three bedrooms 11/2 baths, 28 three bedroom-2 baths, plus study room, 41 four bedroom-2 baths. and 18 four bedroom-2 baths, plus study room). Application may be made for these family units by addressing the Housing Officer, U.S. Naval Postgraduate School, Monterey, California. A certified copy of Orders must accompany application. Assignments are made on the basis of family composition, seniority and date application is received. All units are equipped with gas cooking range and electric refrigerator. Limited amounts of furniture and furnishings are available and issued on the basis of family requirements.






It is emphasized that the above may not include places which will satisfy your needs. There are houses in choice locations which will probably suit your taste but which will also cost much more than the average. An up-to-date listing of private rentals is maintained by the Postgraduate School Housing Officer. This may be consulted at the La Mesa Village Housing Office where a telephone is available for individuals to contact the lessors. Local newspapers are sometimes helpful in finding a place. The Housing Officer is not in a position to find or recommend rental housing for you. That particular chore is up to you.

Purchase Housing

There are of course many opportunities to buy a house in the Monterey area. As in the rental properties there are wide variations in costs. It is understood that prices run somewhat higher than in other desirable residence areas such as Coronado, or Washington, D. C.



MONTEREY PENINSULA

MONTEREY

Every nook and cranny of the Monterey Peninsula has its special appeal for the visitor and resident alike. Carmel Valley which dips back from the sea into Oakstudded, rolling hills, houses many popular resorts. Cattle, horse, fruit, and begonia ranches, charming rambling homes, and several private sports clubs fringe the thimblesized community of Carmel Valley Village where the sun shines most of the time. Hunters and fishermen alike come from vast distances to comb the sea, the streams and forests that parallel the Peninsula highways.

The Monterey Peninsula is becoming increasingly popular as a convention site, due to its excellent accommodations, gracious hospitality and extensive entertainment and sports facilities. It maintains a full time, well staffed Convention Bureau supported by the entire area. Registration, housing, programming and planning group meetings are a few of the many services offered by the bureau.

Annually, the Monterey Peninsula hosts over 100 conventions, conferences, seminars and meetings, varying in size from large to small.

Readily accessible by train, plane and automobile the Monterey Peninsula is situated 120 miles south of San Francisco and 320 miles north of Los Angeles . . . or, thirty minutes west from U. S. Highway 101.

CARMEL

Carmel is a story book village, as one can readily gather with one view of the quaint little streets. The Village itself edges its way down pine-strewn slopes to the sea, its narrow streets and lanes liberally interlaced with entertaining shops, art galleries, innercourt cafes, gourmet restaurants and numerous small theaters.

PEBBLE BEACH

Pebble Beach with its handsome residences, cypress-lined drives, dunes, and dramatically landscaped golf course is one of the outstanding points of beauty on the West Coast.

PACIFIC GROVE

Pacific Grove, situated upon hills that tumble seaward, is a quiet resort town bordering Pebble Beach and the colorful Cannery Row of Steinbeck fame. It offers a unique lure to visitors as the haven of the Migratory Monarch butterflies. The Asilomar conference grounds at the waters edge have a particular attraction for diversified seminars.

SEASIDE

Seaside is the youngest of this group of towns. It is comparatively new, completely modern and growing rapidly along the shore between Monterey and the military installation of Fort Ord.

Again, the Montercy Peninsula is the delight of both professional and amateur sporsters, for here is a variety of world renowned golf courses, tennis clubs, bridle paths, skin-diving coves, crescent shaped beaches and small boat harbors.

MONTEREY, THE OLD PACIFIC CAPITOL

1 --- CALIFORNIA'S FIRST THEATRE A LIVING MONUMENT TO THE PAST

Little did Jack Swan, an English sailor of Scottish ancestry, know that this building, which he completed in 1847, and intended to be used as a saloon and lodging house, would one day be the oldest theater in California. Nor could he know that this building. 115 years after its completion, would be the home of the oldest little theater group in existence still producing the authentic melodrama of the 19th century on a year round schedule.

2 - CASA DEL ORO In the 1850's the building was a

gelle, at me chandise store operated by Joleph Boston & Co. In later years the building was called Casa del Oro because of the unverified story that it was a gold depository.


Restoration is being planned to show what trade was like during that period of Monterey and California history.

Location: Corner of Scott and Olivior Streets.

3 — THE PACIFIC BUILDING

Built in 1847 by David Wight for Thomas O. Larkin, the Pacific Building was first rented to the U.S. Quartermester for offices and storarie of military supplies. Army borses were kept in the large walled corral behind the building. By 1850 the building was known as the Pacific House as it housed a public tavern. The farewell dinner to Gen. Bennett Riley, ex-governor, was held here. At the same time, the newly formed County of Monterey rented space in the building for a courtroom, jury room, and county clerk's office. In later years law offices, a newspaper, small stores and a ballroom occupied the premises. Bull and bear fights.

Location: Corner of Scott Street and Calle Principal.



4 — THE OLD CUSTOM HOUSE

The Old Custom House at Monterey is significant, for here the United States Flag was first officially raised by Commodore John Drake Sloat on July 7, 1846. California and a large adjacent area thus became a part of the Union.

Location: 115 Alvarado Street.

5 - THE LARKIN HOUSE

The Larkin House was built in 1835 by Thomas Oliver Larkin. The attractive, two-storied adobe building was designed by Larkin and its hip roof balcony and veranda became the pattern for Monterey style architecture. He was the first and only United States Consul to California, serving from 1844 to 1846.

Location: Corner of Jefferson Street and Calle Principal.

6 — GUTIERREZ ADOBE

In 1841 the municipality of Monterey granted a lot to Joaquin Gutlerrez. On this land he and his wife, Josefa, built an adobe home typical of those of the average citizens in Monterey during the Mexican period. The house has been donated to the State of California by the Monterey Foundation.

7 - THE STEVENSON HOUSE

7 — THE STEVENSON HOUSE

The original portion of the building dates from the late 1830's, when it was the home of Don Rafael Gonzales. Juan Girardin, pioneer French resident and his wife, Manuela Perez, became the owners in 1856. They made some additions and other changes and rented spare bedrooms to roomers. One of these, Robert Louis Stevenson, occupied a second floor room opening onto the verande during autumn of 1879. Location: 530 Houston Street.
