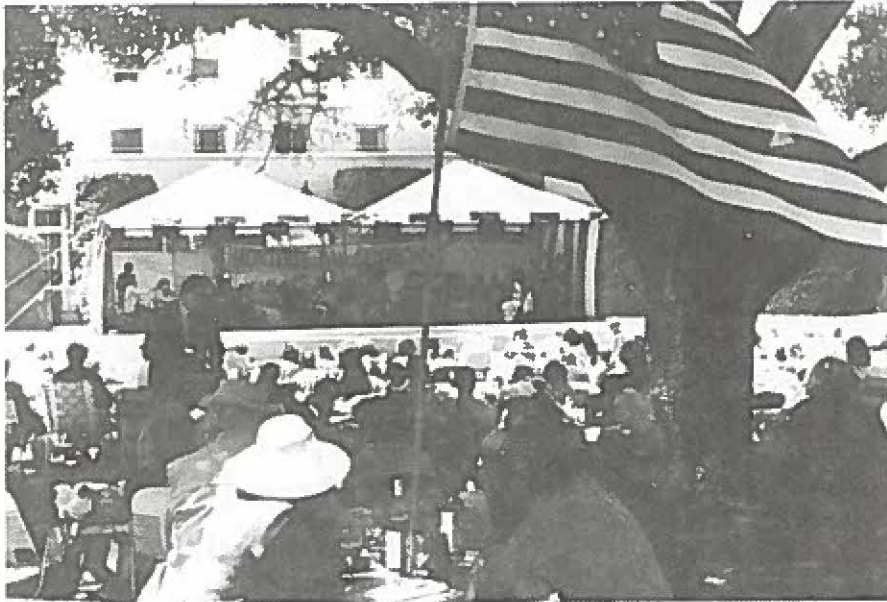

Naval Institute announces contest

The U.S. Naval Institute announces its annual Arleigh Burke Essay Contest.

This year marks the 111th consecutive year that the Naval Institute has sponsored this major naval essay contest.

Three essays will be selected for prizes. Anyone is eligible to enter and win.

First prize earns \$2,000, a gold medal and a life membership in the Naval Institute. First Honorable Mention wins \$1,000 and a silver medal. Second Honorable Mention wins \$750 and a bronze medal.

The topic of the essay must relate to the objective of the U.S. Naval Institute: "The advancement of professional, literary and scientific knowledge in the naval and maritime services, and the advancement of the knowledge of sea power."

Entry rules:

Essays must be original, not exceed 4,000 words and must not have been previously published. An exact word count must appear on the title page.

All entries should be sent to: Publisher, U.S. Naval Institute, Annapolis, Md., 21402.

Essays must be received on or before Dec. 1, 1990 at the U.S. Naval Institute.

All essays must be typewritten, double-spaced, on paper approximately 8 1/2" x 11." Submit two complete copies.

Essays entered in this contest should be analytical and/or interpretive, not just an exposition or personal narrative.

Everything you always wanted to know about

Temporary Lodging Expense

On the surface, Temporary Lodging Expense can be confusing. Here's an explanation of the rules:

Qualifying dates: ANY PERIOD OF TIME BETWEEN MOVING OUT OF PERMANENT HOUSING AND DETACHING YOUR LAST PERMANENT DUTY STATION AND BETWEEN CHECKING INTO YOUR NEW PERMANENT DUTY STATION AND MOVING INTO PERMANENT HOUSING.

A member need not have "cleared" government quarters to be eligible. If you were unable to live in your quarters due to lack of furniture, TLE is payable. Upon arrival, TLE is not payable for the day of arrival itself because of per diem entitlement for that day. (Also, remember that official detaching and reporting dates are being referred to.) Being in the area doesn't count unless you check in at the quarterdeck, stopping your PCS leave. Using the above criteria, select any four qualifying days. These days need not be consecutive, and may even be postponed for a few months after arrival if, for example, arrival of depend-

ents is delayed.

Qualifying locations: Any commercial lodging facility in a reasonable commuting distance from the pertinent permanent duty station. Example: for Monterey, Salinas is considered commutable; Santa Cruz is generally not. You may receive TLE for staying with friends or family, but at the "No Lodging Cost Rate," even if your friend gives you a receipt. Unless your friend owns a motel, he is not in the business of providing lodging.

Required documents: Receipts for all four days, and a completed TLE request form. These forms are available at PSD. Members without dependents in the area must have the TLE form signed on the reverse by the BOQ office. Members with dependents need only their own signature on the front of the form.

When to file: TLE is filed as part of the PCS travel claim. It can be filed later, as a supplemental claim, but cannot be filed earlier. Therefore, if you are transferring and will be entitled to TLE, you may pick up a form from PSD before you leave. However, you cannot file the claim or receive money until after all travel is completed.

Safety office says it's 'a state of mind'

What is on-the-job safety?

Simply put, it is freedom from accidents.

Preventable accidents cause more than two million accidents and 12,000 deaths every year in the U.S. The toll from personal misery, financial setback and time lost from the job, vacation and hobbies is unknown. Conversely, there is no cost when a job is done in a safe manner.

"When a worker tells me, 'but my job isn't dangerous,'" said Steven Melikean, NPS occupational safety and health manager, "I respond 'what matters is not what you do, but how you do it.'"

Department of Labor statistics have shown that more accidents occur in hotels

than shipyards, in department stores than auto plants, and in hospitals than chemical plants.

What causes accidents to occur? An employee's state of mind. Employees who show-off, joke around, are forgetful, tired, lazy, hot-headed, careless, disobedient and/or inexperienced are likely to cause injury to themselves as well as others.

Working conditions such as poor work-place housekeeping, inadequate light or ventilation, trip hazards, and improperly used or stored hazardous materials will increase your risk of injury on the job.

County animal shelter needs volunteer help

Monterey County's Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals needs volunteers to help in the society's wildlife center and shelter.

Volunteers are needed to help with the care of animals.

Some of the opportunities available are:

- Feeding baby birds between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. daily, seven days a week. Baby birds must be hand-fed every five minutes.
- Feeding animals and cleaning cages.
- Handling animals.
- Answering phones; taking information on incoming animals; keeping records.
- Washing dishes, preparing diets.
- Doing laundry.
- Releasing animals.

In the shelter:

- Adoption counseling; making follow-up calls on recent animal adoptions.
- Follow-up calls reminding adopters of the requirement to have their adopted pet spayed/neutered.

AT&T booklets here

A shipment of booklets containing valuable information for every serviceman arrived last week at the public affairs office.

These booklets are published by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

The booklets include phone numbers of housing offices and scheduled airline ticket offices at most military installations in the United States. They list phone numbers for Space A terminals and car rental agencies, airlines, bus lines and hotels that offer special fares for military personnel.

The AT&T booklets list each recreational or special services activity offered by a particular military installation.

The booklets promote the use of the AT&T overseas calling card, the only one issued by a U.S. company that can be used overseas as well as in the United States.
