# Historical Highlights

When the Naval Postgraduate School was established at Annapolis, Md., students attended classes and worked in the labs in their military uniforms.

That changed in June 1934. The "Annapolis Evening Capital" and the "Washington Post" published short news articles announcing the new uniform regulations at NPS. The Post's June 30, 1934 headline read, "Navy School Men May Wear 'Civvies.'"

## Navy School Men May Wear 'Civvies'

### New Regulation Makes Uniforms Optional

Annapolis, Md., June 29 (Spl.).  
It will be optional with student officers attending the Navy Post Graduate School during the course starting Monday whether they wear uniforms or civilian attire.
