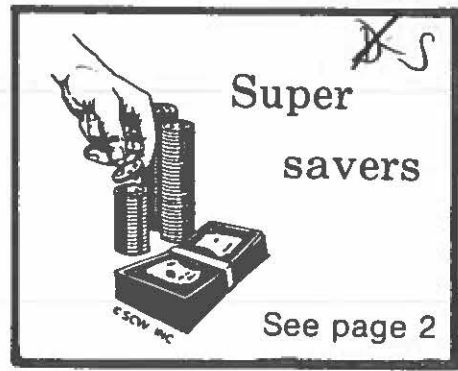

Graduation ceremonies today

VADM Thomas J. Hughes, Jr., USN, Deputy Chief of Naval Operations, Logistics, will be the guest speaker for today's graduation exercises, which will be held at 1430 on Spruance Plaza.

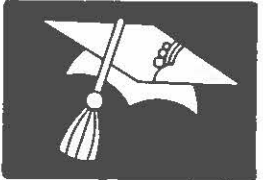
NPS Superintendent, RADM Robert H. Shumaker, will present degrees to 188 students in today's graduation exercises. Of these graduates, 99 are U. S. Navy officers, 36

U. S. Army officers, eight U. S. Marine Corps officers, 17 U. S. Air Force officers, 26 international officers, and two DOD civilians.

A total of 192 degrees will be conferred in today's ceremonies. Included are one electrical engineer, one aeronautical engineer, and three mechanical engineer degrees. Master of science degrees will be awarded to 186 students. One bachelor of science degree will be presented.

VADM Hughes is an alumnus of the Naval Academy and NPS. During his career VADM Hughes has commanded several ships, and served as Commander of Destroyer Squadron 36 and Service Group 2. In 1981 he became the Assistant Deputy Chief of Naval Operations (Manpower, Personnel and Training) (OP-01B).

VADM Hughes has been working to establish a curriculum in combat logistics at NPS. This new program would likely focus on studies of military and domestic transportation systems, providing additional support for Navy and Marine Corps operations.



Elsberry receives Menneken award

Prof. Russell Elsberry was presented the 1985 Carl E. Menneken Research Award at a recent meeting of the NPS chapter of Sigma Xi.

Prof. Elsberry, who has been a member of the NPS meteorology department since 1968, was recognized for his extensive research efforts in tropical and extratropical meteorology, and in modeling and predicting the effects of atmospheric forcing on upper ocean thermal structure.

Sigma Xi is a national research society which seeks to encourage "research in science, pure and applied," said NPS Prof. Alfred Cooper, current president of the local chapter. Members are elected on the basis of their demonstrated potential for research or in recognition of research achievement, he said.

This weekend the club, along with amateur radio clubs throughout the U. S. and Canada, will take part in the American Radio Relay League's (ARRL) annual "field day."

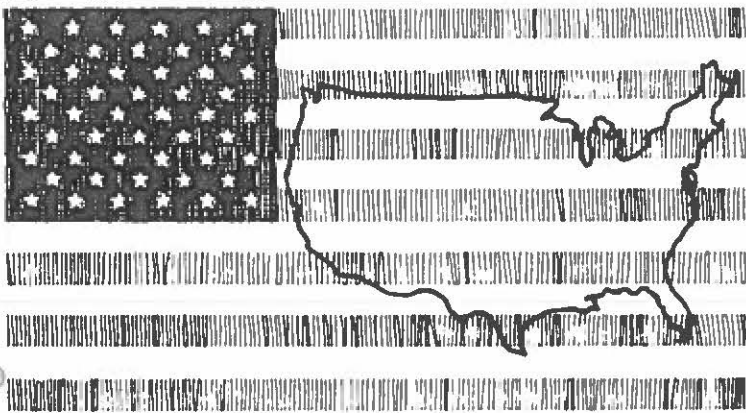
Members will establish emergency communications centers, using portable generators, batteries, solar cells, wind generators or bicycles to provide power for the equipment.
