World record holder

Voyager pilot Rutan to address NPS students Tuesday

In December 1986, Richard "Dick" Rutan, founder of Voyager Aircraft Inc., and his partner Jeana Yeager made aviation history. It took the two pilots just nine days, three minutes and forty-four seconds, without a refueling stop, to set the new record for around-the-world flight. They would more than double the previous absolute world distance record held by the Air Force B-52 bomber.

Four days after pilot Rutan landed the Voyager aircraft, President Ronald Reagan awarded him the Presidential Citizen's Medal of Honor at a special ceremony for the Voyager team. This medal has been presented only 16 times in the history of the United States.

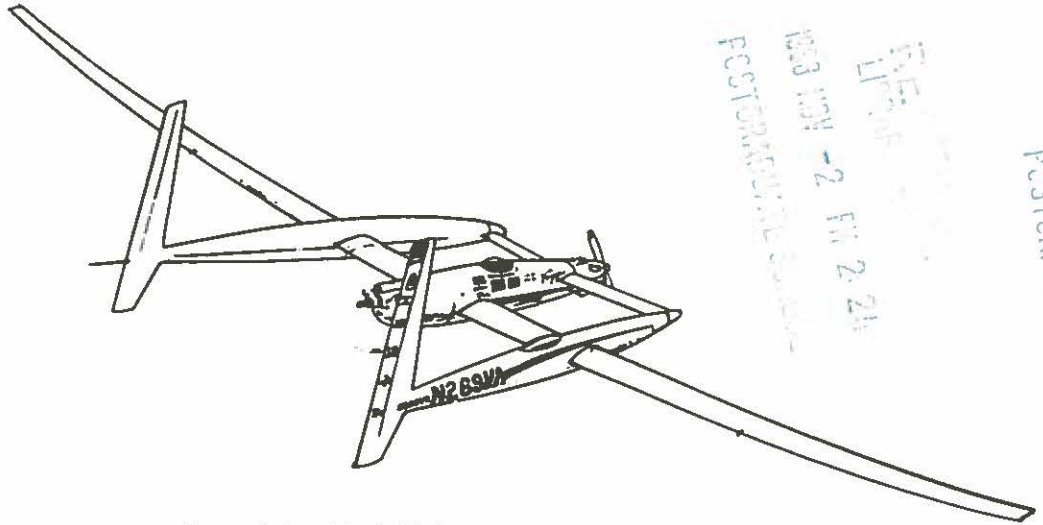
On Tuesday, Rutan will hold two lectures at King Hall. The first lecture will be held at 3:15 p.m. and is open to students only. All students wishing tickets should contact their curricular officers. Tickets for the evening program, co-sponsored by the Naval Postgraduate School Foundation and The Herald, have already been distributed.

Rutan, who has been flying since he was 16 years old, will share his experiences while on the Voyager.

After graduating from high school, Rutan joined the Air Force Aviation Cadet program, where he would earn a bachelor of science degree at the American Technological University.

During most of his 20 years in the Air Force, Rutan was a tactical air command fighter pilot. He flew 325 combat missions in Vietnam. While on his last strike reconnaissance mission over North Vietnam in September 1968, he was hit by enemy ground fire and forced to eject from his burning F-100. He was later rescued by the Air Force's "Jolly Green" helicopter team.

Before retiring from the Air Force in 1978, Lt. Col. Rutan had been awarded the



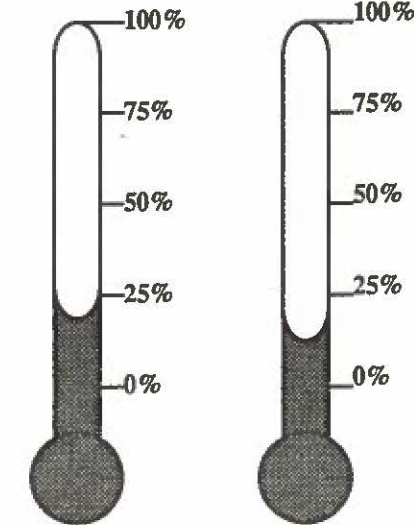
Silver Star, five Distinguished Flying Crosses, 16 Air Medals, and the Purple Heart.

After retirement, Rutan joined his brother as production manager and chief test pilot at Rutan Aircraft factory. He flew the test flight development on the Defiant, the Beech Starship Proof of Concept prototype,

the European Micro Light, the T-46 Scaled Demonstrator for Fairchild Aircraft, and the Long-EZ, in which he set numerous individual world speed and distance records.

In 1982, Rutan was awarded the Louis Bleriot Medal by the prestigious Federation Aeronatique Internationale in recognition of these record flights.

From the Superintendent *by Rear Adm. Robert C. Austin*

On some occasions when writing this column, I have three topics simultaneously come to mind that bring about the thought I'd like to make.

A few years ago while in command, I had a super lieutenant who was my engineer. One day he said, "Captain, I'd like to apply to become a White House Fellow." I broke out the references, read them, and considered his future potential. My first thought was that he was White House material and unhesitatingly recommended him for the program.

A month ago when Vice Adm. James Stockdale was here as a graduation speaker, he remarked about this program. He serves the President as the Chairman of the Commission on White House Fellows. In our conversation, he commented about the absence of naval officers in the current group of selectees.

This past week I received a letter from the director of the Commission on White House fellowships. It stated that the purpose of the program is to provide our nation's most talented future leaders an opportunity to learn about governmental

policy-making and leadership at the highest levels of the federal government. The White House Fellow serves for one year as a special assistant to members of the cabinet, agency heads, the vice president, and senior White House staff members. In this capacity, they have an opportunity to observe and participate in policy-making at the highest levels of the federal government. It is a highly competitive program that selects approximately 20 each year. The letter further urged me to encourage the best of our graduates and faculty to take advantage of the opportunity and apply.

As I look about the Postgraduate School, I see many who have the attributes that are being sought — many are of the same quality as the young engineer I commanded in earlier days, many are spoken to in the letter of solicitation which calls for demonstrated potential for future leadership, intellectual and professional achievement, and commitment to service.

So I would encourage you contact Cmdr. Gary Iversen, my executive assistant. I have designated him as my White House Fellowship coordinator for NPS. Anyone

who feels they have the qualifications and are interested in the program are asked to contact him. Cmdr. Iversen will assist you with fellowship applications and will coordinate fellowship recommendations from the school.

I would hope that an NPS graduate or faculty member would obtain the high honor of acceptance to the President's White House Fellowship program.

A final thought: submit absentee ballots in time. Absentee ballots must be received by election day in order to count.

It was our pleasure to join the crew of the USS Tarawa (LHA-1), on a trip from their San Diego Harbor home to Monterey Bay for Fleet Week. Facilitated by Cmdr. John Donnelly of Electronics and Communications Programs, our trip was part of an NPS initiative to familiarize civilian faculty members with our students' "other life."

The two-and-a-half day journey began with a grand departure from San Diego. Along the way we observed the embarkation of about 60 USMC troops from Camp Pendleton complete with tanks, jeeps, and armored troop transport vehicles. They drove off the beach in LSEs and motored right into the ship's well deck.

The Tarawa provided an opportunity to witness helicopter flight ops, as well as main space operations of a large vessel. The Tarawa CIC was as dark and intense as we expected it to be. LHAs also have a second combat

center dedicated to command and control of forces on and over the beach. As two wanna-be boot ensigns, we were also eager to hit all of the tourist attractions — driving the boat, watching the screw shaft turn, and watching the anchor chain drop. Probably most significant, our trip on the Tarawa allowed us to get the feel, smell, and taste of life afloat.

The Tarawa crew and their USMC guest kept us busy continuously. Everyone aboard took a special pride in displaying their equipment and their operational knowledge. The professionalism and dedication of the crew are our lasting impressions of our visit. We would like to thank our departments, Cmdr. Donnelly, our sponsor Lt. Steve Fatjo, Capt. Tom Blackmon, and especially the crew of the Tarawa for a rewarding and enlightening experience.

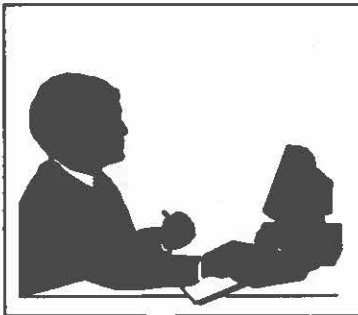
Volunteers needed for EEO collateral duty
